Finds Parasite to Destroy Codlin Moth.

The most important discovery ever made for the benefit of horticulture is announced. It is a parasite which destroys the codlin moth, and was found in South America by George Compere, who was employed jointly by Horticultural Commissioner Cooper and by the West Australian government to find beneficial insects.

Compere is now on his way to ship the first colonies of the bug, or beetle, which will destroy the apple pest. Millions of dollars have been spent by the orchardists of this state yearly in fighting the codlin moth.

This will close a very pleasant year's work, in some respects, for Mr. Reagan. White River Junction, Vt., September 7.—The Republicans won a sweeping victory in the state elections yesterday. Charles J.
