NOTE AND COMMENT.

A deficit of nearly \$7,000,000 in August added to the immense deficit of July makes the deficiency of revenue for the two months \$24,282,456. This may furnish material for argument by stump-speakers. The fact doesn't worry Secretary Shaw who is making political speeches on the Pacific coast. The Tribune of New York says it proves that taxes are not high enough. But times will improve. Such a deficit for two months means a deficit of \$150,000,000 a year, if the ratio continues.
The color line was recently sharply drawn in Hartford, Conn. No colored person could buy a ticket at the railway station without a written permit from the police. Homes of colored people were searched without an explanation, much less a legal warrant. All this because a colored man had shot a white man. It appears that it is quite as much need of upholding the law in Connecticut as in Georgia.
There is some doubt in the minds of public speakers to whom credit should be given for the bounteous harvests. Both parties claim it. If Providence gave us the Philippines possibly the President gave us the crops. At a public dinner in London the Chief Justice was descending upon the virtues of that exemplary monarch, George IV, and the great blessings he had conferred on the English nation. Upon this Lord Erskine begged to remind him of one omission and to "suggest that the national gratitude should be humbly offered to his Majesty for the late abundant harvests."
John Burroughs, the famous naturalist, wishes all the hunters of the country would shoot all the cats in sight. He says that in New England alone the cats kill 25,000 birds each year. One naturally asks how he knows? And if the cats were exterminated, how would the biologists of the Department of Agriculture propose that "rats and mice and such small deer be kept down."
Many men in New York City who have been paying alimony to former wives are now much elated over a recent decree of court that if the former wife takes a second husband the alimony ceases. If a woman really wants a divorced husband to support her, she must remain unmarried.
Since Mr. Richard Harding Davis was unable to get any nearer a Japanese-Russian battle than eight miles, and as he is short sighted, although possessing an active imagination, he has finally concluded to withdraw from Manchuria, and write his letters in camera at Chefoo. They will be quite as interesting and truthful to a satisfactory degree. In fact Mr. Davis might have saved time and expense by remaining in this country.
Some one has discovered that the average income from labor for each person in the United States engaged in agriculture in 1899 was \$288.26. In Iowa it is claimed that the average income for the same class of people is \$611.11.
There is perhaps nothing wiser in human conduct than the sagacity which poor men exhibit in giving away fortunes they do not possess. It is easy to criticize millionaires.
Miss Violet Westcott, daughter of the late Edward Noyes Westcott and joint heir to the fortune which has come from that famous author's "David Harum," is now travelling in Europe. She is of a sunny nature, like her father, in spite of the fact that she is a hopeless invalid and knows that she cannot recover.
Humanity is shocked by the senseless and brutal war in the East, and the terrible sacrifice of the poorest peasants of both countries. While it continues it is a sign of human retrogression, and has no more good in it than the bloody bull-fights of Spain. But the latest news is good news, that "the Japanese have given up all idea of taking the fortress of Port Arthur by storm." This ought to be the end of it.
