Open-air Sanitarium.

The organization of an open air sanitarium company, having in view the treatment of that method of persons afflicted with tuberculosis, is a movement that should meet with hearty approbation and cheerful aid. While a far less proportion of people in this region than in north-eastern states are afflicted with this disease, hitherto usually defying all remedial treatment, and being death's favorite hand-maid, yet many die from it annually in the Pacific northwest, and such an institution as is proposed would be a great public benefaction.

This statement is made in the belief that the open air treatment, along with an accompanying dietary regimen, is efficacious to cure a large portion of consumptives. This fact seems to be established. At least experiments have been so far successful that many eminent specialists in the treatment of consumptives believe it true. Undoubted evidence is convincing that life entirely in the open air, with suitable food, and exercise according to the patient's condition, will cure consumption in a large proportion of cases if undertaken soon enough.

This is probably not the best sort of climate in which to do this work, but the theory now is that the climate is a secondary consideration. The open air is the main thing; and that near home, and not thousands of miles away among strangers and strange scenes, is second in importance.

Such an institution ought to be to some extent a charitable one. That is, while ordinarily requiring payment of patients it should not aim to be a money-making concern, and should manage to accommodate consumptives who cannot possibly pay for their treatment. Thus organized and well established, it should be one likely to do a grandly good work for this city and the surrounding region.—Oregon Daily Journal.
