**Salem State Fair.**

State Fair Grounds, Salem, Or., Sept. 12.—The forty-fourth annual Oregon state fair opened this morning under most favorable auspices, and promises to be one of the successful events of the kind in the history of the state. From the moment that the gates were thrown open at 8 o'clock people began to pour in, and by noon the crowd was estimated at not less than 3,000, comparing most favorably with the attendance on the opening day last year. The smoky condition of the atmosphere has a tendency to shield the throng of people from the hot sun, and weather conditions could not have been better. If these conditions continue a record-breaking attendance is predicted for the week.

When the gates of the fair were thrown open to the public this morning, those who visited the grounds yesterday and witnessed the chaotic and disorderly appearance of things were the ones to express the greatest surprise at the progress which had been made in getting things in readiness over night. The main pavilion, where the greatest disorder existed yesterday, presented a most attractive appearance, and every other department in connection with the big exposition was practically ready for the curtain to rise.

What is considered the most complete and varied agricultural exhibit ever assembled under one roof in this state is on display in the main pavilion. It is also the most representative exhibition of the state's resources, composed as it is of the agricultural, horticultural, mineral, forest and industrial products of six competing counties—Washington, Benton, Lane, Linn, Marion and Polk—besides the exhibit of the Oregon Agricultural college and that of British Columbia, the last being the most creditable display and occupying a prominent location in the pavilion. The creamery building is also filled to overflowing with the choicest of Oregon dairy products, and attracts no little attention, especially the newcomers, who are attending the fair in goodly numbers.

The stock exhibit, while possibly not upon such an extensive scale as that of last year, is quite as complete, and there is scarcely a breed of cattle, hogs, sheep, goats or horses not well represented. Geo. Gammie, superintendent of the stock exhibit, who is superintendent of the government experiment station at Union, says he considers it one of the largest and most varied displays of stock he has ever seen at an exposition of this character. The poultry industry of the state, which has grown to surprising proportions in the past few years, is represented in the poultry pavilion by one of the largest and best exhibitions ever collected in this state. The same may also be said of the machinery and other exhibits on the grounds.

**San Francisco Letter.**

San Francisco, Sept. 10, 1904. Editor HERALD.

DEAR SIR: Thinking a word about the great week that has just passed in San Francisco would be welcome to your many readers, the Knight Templars have held possession of the city for the past week. They came from Maine, Kentucky, Florida and nearly every state in the union; many who never saw the Pacific coast before. Their ride was long and tiresome and they found a welcome here that surprised them. The city was a-buzz with lights from Van Ness avenue to the ferry building at the foot of Market street. At the junction of Third, Kearny and Market streets was an electric display costing thousands. The Call, Chronical and Examiner buildings were covered with flags. The electric display at night was equaled by the flags and ensigns of Sir Knight by day. Tuesday was the day of the great march. Long before the hour the sidewalks were packed for nearly three miles along the route. First came Sir Knights riding 1,000 black horses, the Knights attired in gorgeous uniforms, the finest ever seen in San Francisco.
