GETS LIFE SENTENCE.

Earl Steele Guilty of Murder in the Second Degree.

On Saturday afternoon the attorneys for and against Earl Steele finished their pleadings and the jury took the case. It was 10 o'clock at night when the judge was notified that a decision had been reached, which was murder in the second degree, the penalty for which is life imprisonment in the penitentiary, sentence then and there being pronounced.

District Attorney Brown, as usual, made a vigorous and able prosecution, while the defense was made by Hon. C. A. Sahlbrede and Howard M. Brownell, both of Marshfield, who made a strong fight, but as a matter of course, the jury could do nothing other than find him guilty.
