Work is progressing on the new schooner being built by K. V. Kruse at Ferndale, and if the fine weather continues will soon be ready for launching.

Since the department has given consent that the government scows may be used by private parties for dredging, under certain conditions, we understand that arrangements are being made to do considerable dredging along the Marshfield waterfront.

The powers that be have decided not to move the life-saving station from its present location to Charleston bay. We understand, however, that they have consented to furnish the station with a new lifeboat, to be run with a gasoline engine, and that a telephone line will connect the station with bay points.

We are informed that the O. C. & N. Co. have purchased a suitable steamer for the Coos bay route, to take the place of the Arcata, and that the new vessel will soon be making regular trips to this port.

Forty thousand pickers are now at work in the hop fields of Oregon and about half as many more in Washington and Idaho. Oregon will have about 90,000 bales of 200 pounds each, worth at present prices about \$4,500,000. The pickers in Oregon will receive over \$700,000 in wages. Oregon leads every state in the production of hops, with California, and New York second and third, Marion county, Or., leads all Pacific counties.—Ex.
