(Coos Bay News.)

The schooner Del Norte, which went ashore near the mouth of the Siuslaw last June, was repaired and sailed from the river a few days ago with a cargo of lumber.

During the month of September the Breakwater made five round trips between the bay and San Francisco.

W. J. Wilsey of the Willamette Valley Electric R. R. Co., arrived on the bay Tuesday last, and left on Friday for New York, on business connected with the proposed construction of the road from Eugene to Coos Bay.

W. B. Curtis and August Farley, delegates from Myrtle Lodge, K. of P., left this morning for Seaside, to attend the meeting of the Grand Lodge, which convenes on the 10th.

Berry picking at C. D. McFarlin's cranberry bog on North slough, commenced on Monday of last week. The picking is principally done by the aid of scoops, and 35 cents per bushel is paid. Hand pickers who follow up after the scoops, are paid 70 cents.

The Alliance had a diminutive menagerie on board this trip, consisting of an African lion, a full-grown horse weighing 95 pounds, a dog and a ram. The outfit was bound for Eureka, but will return to Portland for the Fair next year. The lion is the same one which was pitted against bulls in the arena in Mexico a year or two ago, and is a fine looking specimen of the feline tribe.

The machinery for the excelsior plant arrived on the Alliance. The installing of the plant was commenced this morning, and it will be ready for business next week. Enough wood has been secured to last all winter, and arrangements are being made to have a constant supply on hand all the time.

The timber used will be spruce, cedar and cottonwood. The last mentioned grows at certain places on the Coquille. The mixing of white cedar with the spruce and cottonwood, it is said will greatly increase the value of the excelsior when used for mattresses, as it will keep out all kinds of vermin. The proprietors, Messrs. Rust & Bingham, have orders from San Francisco for all the excelsior they can manufacture, and the price rules at about \$18 per ton. At present the factory will furnish employment for eight men; but its capacity will be doubled later on, which means employment for additional hands.

Coal, Coal, Coal.

Editor HERALD: Whatever may be said of the virtues of a contented spirit of being satisfied in the lot which providence has placed them, it is an undesirable fact that it is the restless and uncontented who serve to build up and advance the prosperity of a country. The man who leaves that which is absolutely known and goes beyond the extreme confines of recommended territory, discovers and opens up a new field for man's labor and enterprise to occupy, is surely a boon to humanity. I find just such a man located here at Lamper creek, silently delving beneath mother earth for the last four years, opening up a coal field second to none on the coast. The coal is semi-bituminous of very high grade. It cokes nicely and compares with the coal of British Columbia, hence it will bring in the market of San Francisco \$2 per ton more than any of the lignites worked in this county.

Mr. Timon showed me through all his openings. He has eleven veins ranging in thickness from three to fourteen feet. The vein which he is now working is five and one-half feet, perfectly clean with good roof and floor; it lays at an angle of 39 degrees and ought to be a cheap vein to work. Mr. Timon claims that he can land coal in bunker ready for shipment at a total cost of fifty-five cents per ton. He figures on an eight-hour day, which he says is long enough for any man to work, and the average wages of the county. I fully believe he can do it, as he has millions of tons that can be worked without the aid of machinery. While Mr. Timon owns a large coal field here, he used the precaution to secure the quay and river frontage to thousands of acres, which will enable him at all times to meet all competition.
