NOTE AND COMMENT.

A professor in the University of Vienna announces that at no distant day the antitoxin treatment will be employed in curing scarlet fever. Hasten the day.

The presence of the Archbishop of Canterbury in Washington last Sunday induced the local bishop to modify the collect for the occasion by inserting a prayer for the King of England.

There are those who think that the kerosene motor will displace both steam and electricity on our railways. This will be luck for the poor Standard Oil company if it should prove true.

Any one who wants to hire a special train from New York to Chicago can do so by putting up \$1,664. A gentleman who did lately made the trip of 822 miles in 17 hours and 57 minutes.

The Republican state convention of Massachusetts has finally concluded to permit a declaration in favor of reciprocity with Canada. The fact that 62,000 Republicans signed a petition in favor of this policy was regarded as a hint too be disregarded.

Connecticut is rejoicing over what it calls a bumper crop of tobacco. It is years since anything like it has been seen in that state. While the weight is a little short the quality is extra good. And what is better for the farmers, the prices range considerably higher than usual.

The Census tells us that there are in this country thirty million people "engaged in gainful occupations." The unionized labor force of the country is less than one-tenth of this, and the Federation and the Knights must make many converts before they can claim to be the chief laborers of the country.

The projectors of the National University at Washington deny that the George Washington University makes their pet scheme any the less important or desirable. On the contrary, they declare that it does not fill the bill at all, and they will next winter renew their plea to Congress for an appropriation.

Secretary Wilson of the Agricultural Department says the reason 750,000 foreigners annually land on our shores is that wages are a hundred per cent higher than in any other country on earth. He ought to know, as he landed from Scotland and had very insignificant wages for several years before coming away.

We hear a great deal about the wicked avarice of titled foreigners who pursue and marry American heiresses, but we do not hear half enough about those female vulgar-ians who are companions to the indolence and who permit themselves to be chased by every foreigner of rank without knowing and apparently without caring whether he is an imposter or a gentleman. No

well bred and self respecting woman will ever be caught by a foreigner on account of his title.

During the silly season discussions in London George Meredith, the novelist, comes out in favor of marriage for a limited time, "the state enforcing a provision of money during that period to provide for and educate the children." This might be modified to express and realize General Corbin's idea of no marriage of officers unless they are rich.

Japan frankly acknowledges that she is nearly out of money but has no idea whatever of stopping the war except by force. She has placed an order for 7,500 tons of nickel steel armor for battleships with the Homestead plant. How much might the cost of it do to improve the material condition of the Japanese people if expended in humane ways.

It is reported that Senator Fairbanks intends to have his own way in Indiana, at least so far as booming his successor is concerned. If he drops into the unimportant and silent seat as presiding officer of Senate, he wants a man behind his own desk who will cordially represent him. This is but natural and the coming Vice President need not be blamed if he craves so small a boon.

Secretary Taft is solemnly considering General Corbin's proposition to prohibit the marriage of any army officer whose father of fiancée is not rich. General Corbin got the great idea in Germany when he was the guest of the Emperor. As the salaries of American officers were deliberately fixed by law where they were deemed sufficient to the support of families, Congress may have something to say about the new standard set up. If it is desirable to send no more poor boys to West Point and to establish an American aristocracy—the order of the Golden Epaulets, or some such thing—the prohibition of marriage to any but the sons of millionaires would powerfully conduce to that end.
