Our Annual Hunt.

Walter and I left Riverton on the
27th of August, going over the new
road to Lampa creek, thence over
the Bear creek mountain to Bandon,
thence down the coast to Bagnel
ferry on Rogue river, in a wagon.

One incident on the way needs
recording, viz: while passing down
the Bear creek mountain the neck
yoke broke and we only saved our-
selves and team by buckling the
team into the bank, thereby crip-
pling one horse and breaking the
pole out of our wagon. Arriving at
Bandon we secured a new pole for
the wagon and also a new horse.

We stopped one day on Brush creek
for trout fishing. At Bagnel ferry
we left our wagon in Alf. Miller's
barn, packed our camping outfit on
one horse and Walter and I took
turns at riding the other horse. We
arrived at Frank Lowery's place
that evening. The next Sunday
Frank took his boat with all sup-
plies up Rogue river to the mouth
of Shasta Costa creek, a dis-
tance of 26 miles above the ferry.

Walter and I took the four horses
over the trail to the same place,
fording Rogue river a mile below
Shasta Costa. Of all trails that
we have passed over during our
various trips, that trail beats them
all. In passing over Painted Butte
the trail passes over a rocky point,
which really overhangs the river at
an elevation of about 400 feet above
the water. Not being used to such
trails we preferred to walk and lead
our horses around such places.

The next morning we packed our
horses and started up the trail for
Sugar Leaf camp which is 14 miles
from Rogue river and almost all the
way a heavy climb. We arrived in
camp at 5 o'clock that evening
thoroughly tired out. Here we
stopped one day, but finding good
deer scarce, we moved camp five
miles further to Fishhook camp,
where we secured two deer. We
became thoroughly disgusted and
started back home, but Frank per-
suaded us to re-camp at Sugar Leaf.
We then searched over a new hunt-
ing ground and there we found
some good deer. We killed nine
fine bucks which we dried. We al-
so had some excitement over a bear
hunt. We killed one very large
bear but his hide being no good
and being very poor, we left his
carcass lie where we killed him. It
is the way we got some very good
pictures of our camp life, including
two of the bear. While at Sugar
Leaf camp we met Dr. Patterson,
of Visalia, California, also Mr. Red-
field, of Grants Pass, who is known
as the champion rifle shot of Ore-
gon. We found both to be jolly
fellows and enjoyed their visit very
much. Returning home we stopped
all night at Mr. Coolie's place, op-
posite the mouth of the Illinois riv-
er. Here we had a genuine feast
on water melons, for which Mr.
Coolie receives our thanks. Arriv-
ing at Mr. Lowery's place and look-
ing over our small supply of veni-
son, Walter proposed we go up on
Wild Horse mountain and get some
fresh venison, so we went up there
and got four more fine bucks, but
on our return to the river it com-
menced to rain and rained four

days so we had to cut up the meat
and dry it, and we could take only
a pair of hams to eat on the way
home. Notwithstanding all of our
ill luck, we had a splendid time.
We returned to Riverton on the 29th
of September, having been gone
a little over a month.

Trains Met on Curve.

Kansas City, Mo., Oct. 10.—
Twenty-seven persons were killed
and thirty injured, some of them
fatally, in a head-on collision today
two miles southeast of Warrenburg,
Mo., between the second section of
Missouri Pacific passenger train
No. 30, which left Wichita, Kan.,
last night for St. Louis with
World's Fair excursionists, and the
heavy westbound extra freight.
The collision occurred in what is
called "Dead Man's Bend." Both
engines and both firemen saw the
danger and jumped. The for-
ward coach of the passenger train
telescoped and the remainder of
both trains were badly damaged.
