### A Serious Question.

The Carnegie Steel company lately issued a circular letter to the superintendents of the different plants and to the heads of departments in the plants instructing them to employ no men over 35 in some of the departments and extending the age limit in others to 40.

This is not an order discriminating against old men, but against men who are supposed to be in the very prime of life. It can only be interpreted to mean that a man has but about twenty effective working years; that after he reaches the age of 40 he is not an effective factor in industrial life.

But, says the New York American, he will often persist in living until he is 70. Who will pay his board and keep these thirty years? The trust got what is called his life work—twenty years. Then it must pay him enough money in twenty years to keep him the rest of his life, if it would be fair.

Against the assumption that a man is "worked out" at the ages designated rises the record of all experience in responsible endeavor. It is certain, says the Pittsburgh Press, that in the ordinary understanding of things a man under 35 is hardly regarded as being a man. If the steelworker is to be disqualified for the pursuit of his vocation at an age when the majority of workers in other occupations are just beginning to be thoroughly qualified, what is to become of him? Is he paid enough during the comparatively short period in which he is useful to keep him the rest of his life? If the wear and tear of the business, plainly confessed by this order, is so frightful, should not wages be advanced to the bases of forty years' pay for twenty years' work?

The duties of life are heavy upon a responsible man at 35 or 40. His family is usually at that time in the most expensive period of its development. The demands of the community he cannot wholly ignore. He fills an active and responsible place toward public utilities of various kinds—of church, of schools, of charity, of civic improvement. With his resources arbitrarily cut off, what will become of the promises to pay for which every upright life stands? These questions are of a serious nature to the man condemned to be placed upon the list of the non-effective while yet in the prime of life and with many of its most serious obligations still to be discharged.

The concrete foundation is completed and brick laying on the walls of the new Elks' temple is progressing in this city. It will be an imposing structure when completed.

Among the counties which have already filed petitions for a vote on prohibition at the November election are Klamath, Jackson, Coos, Lane, Douglas, Linn, Baker and several other counties in the eastern part of the state.

An order has been placed for the necessary building material for the new broom factory to be erected in the Kinney addition on the south side of the railroad track, a short distance east of the packing house of the Umpqua Valley Prune Growers' Association. The Oklahoma parties who will operate the new factory have been notified that their terms and requirements will all be met and that the greater part of the cash required to put up the building had already been provided. It is therefore expected that the shipment of machinery and broom corn, which will fill six or eight cars, will be sent forth at once and that the factory will be ready to begin operations by the beginning of the new year.
