Mr. Davenport was driving his colt to a cart and the runaway team came up behind him with such speed that he could not get out of the way, the wagon tongue struck the cart, sending the old gentleman high in the air and ran over him when he fell. The most serious hurt he received was a severe cut in the back of the head, there a sliver of the skull being broken off. He was unconscious for some time, but has recovered consciousness and is fast recovering from the shock, and we are exceedingly well pleased to state that he will be himself again in a short time, as this may be looked upon as nothing short of a miraculous escape.

Late War News.

Mukden, Oct. 19.—It is reported here that the Japanese are retiring slowly and fires along their line indicate that they are burning their stores preparatory to a general retreat.

Mukden, Oct. 19.—The Japanese left flank has just been driven back by a Russian brigade. The Russian losses were heavy.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 19.—It is reported that the Japanese at the Shabke river are weakening owing to an insufficient supply of projectiles.

Rome, Oct. 19.—A report has reached here that the Russians have received reinforcements of 20,000 from Kiron, and the Japanese have been reinforced by a brigade from New Chwang.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 19.—During an advance of the left column, forty Japanese soldiers and five officers were surrounded in a Chinese village but only five surrendered, the remainder committing suicide.
