Over 25 boats were trolling off town yesterday afternoon—nearly 60 fish were brought ashore by the enthusiasts.

The Empire cannery cleaned up all its fish yesterday. The output from there this year will be close onto 10,000 cases.

E. S. Dow received the storm signal flags this morning and will display same from the pole over Dean Lumber Co.'s store.

A dispatch last week brought the news that W. G. Webster, formerly of Marshfield, had lately died at his home at Globe, Arizona.

The four-masted barkentine Chelalis was towed from Port to the lower bay Saturday to finish loading lumber for the Philippines. Her draft when loaded is 18½ feet.

Several men are busy at the cold storage plant, freezing silversides for J. H. Mason. Fish have been coming in lively for the past few days, and indications are that the order of sixty tons for the German market will be filled without trouble.

Frank Smith commenced taking salmon eggs at the South Coos river hatchery last Thursday and now has 150,000 on hand. The little rise in the river brought over 600 chinooks up to the rack, and from now on he expects a steady supply of fish. Several million eggs will be taken care of at the hatchery this season.

With the Santa Fe building along the coast from San Francisco to Eureka, or within 100 miles of the Oregon line, it begins to look as if our dream of a coastwise road to Portland is about to be realized.

With two electric lines tapping a coast road at Coos bay and Florence, southern Oregon will develop rapidly.—Jacksonville Times.

Washington, Oct. 17.—The war in the Orient has enlisted the closest attention of the administration, and it is felt that the time is approaching when it will be in order for the great neutral powers to move toward the restoration of peace.

President Roosevelt has from the first stood ready to use his good offices to stop hostilities on a basis honorable to both belligerents, but he is estopped from moving by the fact that it has been the unbroken rule of our government to wait until it is assured that both sides to a controversy of this kind are willing that we should act. There has so far been no open proposition, nor can it be truthfully stated that even an indirect overture has come to Washington from St. Petersburg or Tokio, but it is believed signs point to an early move in that direction.

Again the Japanese army is victorious and again the forces of Russia under General Kuropatkin have been shattered and driven back. The stereotyped plea of unreadiness cannot be urged in this instance as the cause of the defeat of the Slavs. General Kuropatkin, in taking the aggressive, declared himself ready to meet his adversary. The latter accepted the challenge, met the Russian army more than half way and drove it again to cover. Oyama's generalship has again been proven to be superior to that of Kuropatkin, though in the forward movement of the Russian army a few days ago it looked as if the Japanese commander had the worst of it. The horrors of war were probably never more appalling than they have been in this fierce struggle between Slav and Jap. Distance, however, separates them from the view of civilized peoples, and expectation stands on tiptoe, overlooking the tragedies of gory battlefields in the hope of discovering the beginning of the end—the beginning of wider national life for Japan and the end of Russian aggression in the Far East—Oregonian.
