HOLD YOUR PORK.

The COQUILLE CO-OPERATIVE PACKING COMPANY'S manager desires all growers of pork to hold back their pork from sale until they have heard of his proposition. This company will be prepared to handle the entire pork crop by the time the corn-fed pigs come into season. The company proposes to pay hog growers the prevailing prices for their live weight, and then to equally share with them the profits which result from the sale of the manufactured article. The same arrangement will be given to beef and poultry raisers.

This packing company is going into the shipment of dressed poultry and beef for the San Francisco market. The company has arranged to have cold storage placed on one of the steamers for this feature of its shipping business, so that meats may be dressed here, and arrive in San Francisco in the very best of condition, only three days from the day of slaughter.

It is the purpose of the manager to introduce the manufacture of preserved edibles from the several products as they come in season throughout the year; peas, string beans, jams and jellies from berries, preserved plums, dried and evaporated apples, starch, salmon, pork, the shipment of Steel-head salmon, and so forth. The same arrangement will be given to producers of all kinds of edibles as are offered on meat, namely, that the prevailing price will be paid them for the raw product, and then the profit which is realized from the sale of the manufactured article will be equally divided between the producer and the corporation.

A provision in the articles of incorporation of this company forever secures for the producer this share in the profits of the manufactured article.

The producer, being a stockholder in the corporation, will realize also a profit from the earnings of the corporation, according to the amount of stock which he holds. It will only share its profits with producers who have stock in the company.

This company will have its agents in San Francisco to sell goods as fast as they are contracted for at this point. The San Francisco agent will not doubt be one of the Coquille townsmen, so that the Coquille's shipments and business will be in the hands of a person who is well known to the Coquille people. The Century Mercantile Company of San Francisco, through whose instrumentality this company is being organized, will offer its office and business connections to the packing company, in the mere hope of becoming established as a reliable channel through which the company's products may be marketed. The connection is not in any way binding on the Packing Company. In fact, it will not have anything to do with the Packing company unless the Directors so desire.

The Coquille country is more favorably situated for a general packing business than any other near-by location. Its products are not only varied, but the variety is produced by each settler. Each family produces pork, apples, peas, butter and salmon. A packing company could run throughout the year with these varied manufactures, and many persons employed the year round. Such a varied manufacture will make Coquille the industrial center of the Coquille river.

Auction of baskets.

Coos County Oil Shewing.

We take the following from the Portland Daily Journal of the 20th: A business man of Coquille, Or., who is in Portland on a brief visit, stated this morning that his community was keenly interested in the oil developments at Bandon, down along the Coos coast. It has been generally known for some time that a well was being bored on the shore near Bandon, but the favorable results being attained at a depth of 1,000 to 1,100 feet are quite recent public knowledge. The result has been to cause the community to follow the drill closely as the management will permit news to get aboard.

Two strata of oil-bearing sand have been penetrated, and there has been an exceptionally strong blast of natural gas for some time. The pressure from gas interfered so materially with the work that the channel admitting it had to be cased in three places. Everything points to a good oil district, and the antine formation has been sufficiently tested to satisfy the oil operators that oil and gas would be confined at deep levels in the proper basins, permitting commercial work.

Mothers' and Teachers' Meeting.

No Dancing at Syracuse.

Syracuse, N. Y., Oct. 20.—Chancellor Day, of Syracuse University, has declared in an address to the students that dancing must cease. The chancellor so decided because of the dances given by an organization of college women who have been holding weekly parties at the Westminster Hall. Dr. Day said: "Those dances militate against scholarship and study. Any attempt to hold a dance after this will be taken as a deliberate notice of your intention to be no longer one of us."

Late War News.

Mukden, Oct. 22.—Field Marshal Oyama's counter-offensive was definitely checked, with the loss of men, guns and munitions. General Kurapatkin's army extends along a line running over 124 miles south of Mukden, and is supported by strong fortifications on the Hun River. Present calm is enforced by the exhaustion of the armies on both sides, which lost in killed and wounded 80,000 men during the ten days' fighting.

There is every indication that the battle will be resumed soon, and that a decisive result will be achieved.

With the Russian Eastern Army headquarters, by way of Mukden, Oct. 22.—Both armies remain practically inactive. The Russians have reoccupied Tantsiaputzy. The Japanese hold a position on high ground sloping down to the Shalke river. There is continual firing and sniping, and the batteries occasionally engage in a duel westwards.

General Mischtenko fought a brisk engagement October 20. He reports progress and the capture of guns.

The two armies are receiving fresh supplies of ammunition. There is an indication of an early renewal of hostilities, with the Russians taking the offensive.

The weather is cold. A rough estimate of the Russian losses during the recent battle places them at 45,000, of which 10,000 were killed.

The correspondent of the Associated Press who filed this dispatch was attacked by Chinese bandits while riding to rejoin his corps.

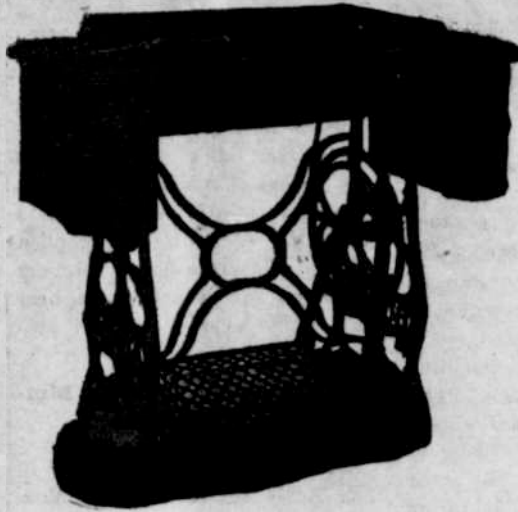
