Brakeman Loses a Foot.

Roseburg, Or. Dec. 18,-Early this morning "Cad" Harmon, a Southern Pacific Railroad passenger of Northbound overland train No. 16, at Riddle, and one of his legs was so badly mangled at the ankle that the foot had to be amputated. He was preparing to alight from the train as it entered the station and in the darkness did not notice that the car steps had been torn off by some obstruction alongside the track, and this caused him to fall




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
