Russia Wants No Peace. St. Petersburg, Jan. 6.—The Novoe Vremya says today: The voice of the nation should give answer to the peace talk current abroad, in order that the world may understand once and for all Russia's position, and that the idea of ending the war at this juncture is abhorrent to the Russian people. The Emperor should consult the representative of the land, as his predecessors did before the days of John the Terrible. The army, this paper declares, holds the fate of Russia in its hands. It is stated on the best authority that the battle on the Shakhe river is about to be resumed, the Russians taking the offensive. This was decided at a meeting of the Council of Ministers yesterday. The greatest confusion reigns in the interior of the empire. One chief of police has been killed. In several places the rioters set fire to all the prisons. The chief killed was at the head of the Warsaw department. Fires in the prisons occurred near Karakoff. Damages Are Asked. By his attorney this afternoon F. W. Wooley, chairman of the board of directors of school district No. 4, (Roseburg) filed an action against the Plaindealer Publishing Company, of this city, including the editor and manager, for damages amounting to \$10,000, for the publishing of defamatory and libelous articles against him in the Plaindealer of recent dates, the complaint alleges. The articles referred to charged him, as a member of the school board, with extravagantly and otherwise improperly handling school funds of the district, and with other improper actions. The articles were signed "Taxpayer," but the Plaindealer managers refused to give the name of the author, and it is therefore held that the management of the paper is responsible for same.
