We had a splendid and enthusiastic convention January 3rd, but now we have a work before us. Enthusiasm is good so far as it goes; but it will not pay the expenses of carrying the matter of the injunction through the courts. Those who were present subscribed liberally to the fund. But in the nature of things hundreds of those who voted for local option could not attend the convention. It is to you, friends of the cause who live in various parts of the county, that this appeal for funds is particularly directed. If every voter who voted for local option in November will send to the treasurer, A. H. Mulkey, Coquille, from \$1.00 to \$10.00 we will have an ample fund to see that the law is properly enforced. There is very little doubt but that the injunction will be dissolved, and the law will be declared in force. But every effort will be made to hinder its enforcement. It will be tested in the Supreme Court by the saloon keepers. However, we have nothing to fear as this identical law has been declared constitutional in other states, notably Texas. It all depends on you voters who voted for the law. Will you demand that the majority rule, and will you back up that demand by contributing to the necessary expense of putting your expressed will into effect? Send all contributions to the treasurer.
