## A Plan to Market all the Butter Products of the Coquille Valley Under One Brand.

The name of the brand shall be "From Coquille Blossoms." Each creamery will be provided with wrappers bearing that brand. Ranchers may demand of creameries that their milk be manufactured into butter under that brand, and if refused, they may send their milk to one certain creamery where they may be accommodated.

This certain creamery which will be selected to manufacture "From Coquille Blossoms" but will also act as book-keeper, inspector, and shipper for all butter marketed under the brand, so far as this supervision may be necessary. But it is thought that but little change from the present methods will be noticeable for the reason that each creamery will continue with its present milk producers. Accounts will be paid each month as is customary, and returns from sales will be made directly from the Commission firm who is handling the butter to each creamery.

But only one firm at a time will handle the butter in San Francisco. The Coquille Co-operative Packing Company will undertake the enterprise for One Percent of all sales returns. It will furnish the legally protected brand, together with all attention, advertising, and promotion which is necessary to put the brand upon the market successfully. This includes office facilities in San Francisco, where a regular agent of the brand may be found at all times. It also includes information and correspondence upon market conditions. Through its San Francisco correspondent, the Century Company, it will build up the Coquille butter to the position which Humboldt butter holds. It will invite and consider proposals from San Francisco commission firms and other consumers of butter, cause competition, and endeavor to take advantage of market conditions. It will oversee the business transactions in San Francisco, thus insuring promptness as to sales returns, and will also endeavor to secure better freight rates and shipping facilities. It will direct consignments.

Comment: This plan is simple and effective. It avoids red tape. A creamery can enter it without risking its own interests in any way. This is an age of combinations. The Packing Company manager is better able to obtain the results desired than any other man in the valley, this because of his excellent San Francisco connections. There will be a live man on the ground here to keep all things working smoothly, and a thorough business firm in San Francisco to take advantage of any opportunity which might present itself to advance the butter interests. The combined butter producers of the Coquille will have a head and tail, and money back of them.

This is perhaps the most important proposition which has appeared in the dairy business since Judge Schroeder's creamery started. This plan would secure enough butter under one brand to demand attention from San Francisco consumers. Quantity always demands attention in a large market, and invariably means better prices. A raise of three or four cents in the price of butter from Coquille should result from the success of such a move.

Creamery men and others who are interested in the project will please write the Packing Company, expressing their views on the proposition. This is the enterprise which is being established for the benefit of members of the Century Mercantile Company, a co-operative merchandise company, through which consumers can purchase their supplies at wholesale and factory prices. The foundation of interest which the Century Company has in the country is merchandise, but it realizes the necessity of marketing its members' products in order to enable them to purchase supplies in San Francisco.

The move to organize the butter interests is done solely in order to advance their members' welfare.
