### Our Mines.

W. T. Estberg, president of the Mides Mining and Milling Company, and his wife are stopping at the Guerin Hotel in this city, having lately spent several days at the mines. Mr Estberg is also president of the Commander Mines on South Sixes river and at each of these mines he has caused to be expended many thousands of dollars during the last year putting these mines in working order. At the Mides on Poverty gulch a five-stamp mill running night and day reducing ore that has been raised from considerable depth at the old Divilbiss claims and brought to the mill by a new and improved tramway, and the ore improves as the miner goes down to lower depths, and the assay lately made proves beyond doubt that this mine is one of the best in southwest Oregon. The Company has a large group of claims along Poverty gulch extending over a mile above the mill where tramways have been built so that a cheap method is provided to bring ore from Big Joe and Little Mary, two promising claims at the upper end of this property, at which place very rich ore was found in earlier years and about two thousand dollars was extracted from quartz with a hand mortar in less than a week. Besides the stamp mill and latest improved concentrator at this place a sawmill has been erected and is running all the time, furnishing lumber for the buildings and other extensive improvements now in contemplation. Indeed the place now presents a picture of a little village, with tramways flumes, water piping and machinery closely situated between two large mountains by the side of a rushing stream of sparkling water, where industry in all its wining phases is evident so the visitor.

These mines are about 30 miles south of Myrtle Point and is reached by a wagon road which terminates at Deer Park, leading six miles of trail, but President Estberg informs us that the wagon road will be extended to the mines in the early spring. The road will pass the famous Salmon Mountain mine where there is much work being done, hence the road will be of great benefit, as it will accommodate the Nugget Patch and Johnson Creek in general. The Commander mine on South Sixes is on a straight line about six miles southwest of the Mides property. Here very extensive improvements have been going on for a year or more. Two dams have been built—one 40 feet across Sixes river, this was to obtain pressure for hydraulic operations, and one dam 20 feet high to obtain power for mining. A sawmill is run daily and lumber in abundance will soon be on hand. The "giants" are at work with ample pressure, and bed rock has begun to show shining metal and it is believed that a "clean up" will soon appear satisfactory. The flume, 3x4, is being built over a mile long to bring water to the rich placer grounds. The company has very promising quartz holdings at various places in this section cropping out of the hills on each side of the river. They have purchased the farm known as the Avery place situated near the mines so their supplies for men and teams will be at hand. The outlook for the mining industry in Coos and Curry counties is more favorable than the majority of the varied industries of this favored region, as other operations will soon be inaugurated to reach the untold wealth hidden in the hills on the Upper Coquille river.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.

### NOTE AND COMMENT.

The immigration figures show a falling off of forty per cent in the arrivals at the port of Baltimore, during the year just closed. These would be encouraging figures if the decrease were not made up at New York to which port the great reduction in steamer rates brought about a greatly increased number of immigrants.

The answer is given now in the cotton belt where an ideal season and crop surpassing anything ever known are succeeded by recrimination and malediction of an intensity never heard after the worst failures.

Communications to the Governor of Colorado should be made by title and not by name. Colorado voters and votesses are famously fickle.

Notwithstanding a drizzling rain that fell for the greater part of the day, seven thousand people formed in line about the White House and were rec'd by the President on New Years day. So far no deaths have been reported and the President had so far recovered that he was able to go to the theatre in the evening.
