A sidewalk is being laid from the foot of the hill to the boat landing. This is a much needed improvement and will give strangers a better opinion of the town when they can walk on a sidewalk instead of in the mud.

Several amendments will be made to the city charter of Myrtle Point this session of the legislature. It is proposed to extend the limits of the town by taking in more of the section on the west side of the river. Some other amendments asked are as follows: Recorder to be appointed instead of elected. Females owning property within the city limits be given right to vote on assessments on such property affected. City to have power to levy and collect a ten mill tax.

Washington, Jan. 12.—"The people of Oregon can rest assured that a river and harbor bill will be passed this session." This statement was made by Senator Fulton tonight after a conference with Chairman Burton, of the House committee on rivers and harbors.

"But," adds the Senator, "it will be a comparatively small bill. The House committee is scaling down appropriations to the lowest notch, and is cutting out many items altogether. Only the most important projects will be cared for and some of them will be sacrificed."

Senator Fulton is satisfied that ample provision will be made for continuing the improvement of the mouth of the Columbia and that reasonable appropriation will be made for maintaining an open channel from Portland to the sea. Just what amounts the House committee will agree to he does not know as yet. The committee has not yet considered the Pacific Coast items.

This is the Packing Company Which Made the Hit on Turkeys.

This is the Packing Company which is going to make a hit on butter.

In the several last issues of the HERALD, the general plan of marketing all of the butter of the valley under one brand was presented. In this article the details of its management are more fully gone into, with especial reference to the management of the central creamery which is to manufacture butter under the chosen brand in the interest of Century Mercantile members, and each person who is seriously interested in the proposition is requested to keep this copy of the HERALD handy for future reference, as the cost of advertising is considerable, and it is desired to not repeat more often than necessary.

The general plan is to let each creamery of the valley put up its butter in wrappers of the one brand, and the name of the brand shall be "From Coquille Blossoms" and let all ship through the packing company manager here to the highest bidding commission merchant in San Francisco. This central creamery will be conducted on the co-operative plan known as the "Moody Method of Concentrating Cream," (see Hoard's Dairyman) under the direction of the Coquille Co-operative Packing Company.

By the Moody Method only cream is received by the Central creamery. Uniform density of the cream and uniform color of the butter is thus secured. Uniform density of the cream is secured by having one man, an expert, go around regularly to repair and regulate the separators adjusting them to a common standard. The method of adjusting all separators to a common standard also secures peace in the family. The butter tests vary less.

At the height of the season a launch will leave Banden regularly every morning to take up the cans to the creamery, and will return cans in the afternoon on its way back. The same arrangement will be made with Myrtle Point.

Milk producers will be privileged to elect the various employees of the creamery, but to begin with they will be appointed by the Coquille Co-operative Packing Company, until the business is in thorough working order. Milk producers are earnestly cautioned against the many plans and ideas of this, that and the other fellow. The proposition has a head and a tail now, so keep on the one form of the proposition until it has a body. There are now enough Century subscribers among milk producers of the valley to produce 1500 lbs. of butter per day. All of the big ranches are in. Later on, after capable men have been found among the milk producers, the entire creamery interests will be made over a regularly incorporated company composed of the customers of the Central creamery, upon an equitable basis of distribution which will be discussed in due course of time.

For the present the Coquille Co-operative Packing Company will manage the enterprise for one cent per pound of all sales returns. It will furnish the legally protected brand, together with all attention, advertising, and promotion which is necessary to put the brand upon market successfully. This includes office facilities in San Francisco, where a regular agent of the brand may be found at all times. It also includes information and correspondence upon market conditions. Through its San Francisco correspondents, the Century Mercantile Company, it will build up the Coquille butter to the position which Humboldt butter holds. It will invite and consider proposals from San Francisco commission firms and other consumers of butter, cause competition, and endeavor to take advantage of market conditions. It will oversee the business transactions in San Francisco, thus insuring promptness as to sales returns, and will also endeavor to secure better freight rates and shipping facilities. It will direct consignments.

Outside of this cost of one cent per pound, the manufacture and sale of butter will be given for merely what it costs. After the returns from each sale are received, a detailed statement of the returns, together with the detailed statement of the cost of manufacture and marketing will be made each customer.

Local Option Convention.

There will be an important adjourned meeting of the local option convention on Friday, January 20th at 10 a. m., or on arrival of the boats, at the court house. The secretary has received word from Judge Hamilton that a hearing on a motion to have the temporary injunction dissolved can be had at any time. The attorney for the league, Judge Bronaugh, is now looking into the case, and action will be brought in a few days to have the injunction dissolved. The constitutional committee has drafted a constitution and will report to the convention—so that this will be an all-important meeting. Let the friends of the law bestir themselves to raise the necessary funds to carry the case through the courts. The abolition of saloons everywhere has greatly increased the value of property, reduced taxes and criminal expenses, and improved the moral condition of the community, from which saloons are excluded. It will do the same for Coos county. Shall we neglect to reap these great benefits of our victory at the polls for the lack of a few hundred dollars? Don't wait for someone to come and ask you to contribute; send your dollar or five dollars to the treasurer, A. H. Mulkey, Coquille. Several ladies have inquired if we are going to let them help us. Yes, of course. Ladies interested may go ahead and organize clubs or take up subscriptions to press our suit. The Banden W. C. T. U. has already volunteered to raise funds for the league.
