## Educational Department at the Fair.

Portland, Oregon, Jan. 9, 1905.

To Oregon's Educators:  
The Educational Department  
of the Lewis and Clark Centennial  
Exposition has adopted the follow-  
ing plan of exhibit, viz: To make a  
carefully and thoroughly graded ex-  
hibit from the kindergarten to the  
university. So far as practicable  
the exhibit will be arranged by  
counties. For purposes of organi-  
zation the county will be the unit.

The Educational Department recom-  
mends, however, a collective presen-  
tation of the work from different  
counties, except in cities having  
special supervision. The collective  
exhibit plan will require that ma-  
terial furnished by the different  
schools be assembled at some county  
center, arranged, labeled, and  
shipped by county organizations.

Papers that best illustrate county  
plan of exhibit will be placed in ex-  
hibit cabinets, others will be bound  
at the expense of the State Commis-  
sion.

The arrangement will be by sub-  
jects and grades, beginning with  
the lowest grade. A typewritten  
statement or outline of the work to  
be exhibited in cabinets is essential  
to a correct understanding and pre-  
sentation of the exhibit.

Exhibit cabinets are to be pur-  
chased by exhibitors. This Depart-  
ment recommends that these cabi-  
net be kept at some convenient  
county location after the Exposition  
closes and become the center for  
the reception of meritorious  
work which may be supplied from  
time to time to the end that the ex-  
hibit idea may be made a useful  
adjunct for encouraging excellence  
of pupils' work.

It is the desire of the Department  
that the Oregon educational exhibit  
shall honestly represent the real  
work of the schools in the best way  
possible. Local industries should  
form the foundation for a large  
share of language and geography  
work. Grain farming, stock rais-  
ing, fruit and vegetable culture, be-  
come at once the choicest of topics  
for written work. Visiting observ-  
ers are always pleased and bene-  
fited by the stories children write  
of their own environment.

Our educational exhibit will come  
directly into comparison with that  
from such states as Massachusetts,  
New York, Missouri, Wisconsin and  
California, as well as our North-  
western states. We want the com-  
parison to be such as will fully ex-  
press the good work being done all  
through the state. Each school dis-  
trict in the state is cordially invited  
to send something for the exhibit.  
Local interest and local pride will  
certainly stimulate each to do its  
best.

Port Townsend, Wash., Jan. 31—  
The tug Holyoke arrived at Port  
Angeles this morning at 1:30 with  
S. S. Snyder, chief engineer, of  
Olympia, badly scalded on the body  
and legs, and the third assistant  
scalded on the face and arms. Syn-  
der's condition is quite serious, but  
the doctors say both have a good  
chance for recovery. The Olympia,  
which reached Port Angeles later in  
the morning, reported that her  
boiler-head blew out Friday eve-  
ning while off Race Rocks. She  
will probably return to Seattle for  
repairs.

gineer on the Sound tug Boyden.  
Captain H. B. Weaver, of the Clym-  
pia, was formerly master of the Ro-  
anoak. The Olympia had left Co-  
mas, where she took fuel coal, and  
was on her way to Moji for orders.

Washington, Jan. 21.—The  
President has approved and the  
General Land Office today issued a  
patent to the State of Oregon for  
the benefit of the Southern Irriga-  
tion Company, of Portland covering  
11,640 acres of land known as List  
No. 1, under the Carey act. This is  
the first patent that has been given  
to Oregon under this law. W. B.  
Mathews, who was attorney for the  
State of Oregon in its Klamath  
swamp land case, represented the  
state in this transaction.

## NOTE AND COMMENT.

"I do not think our banks are safe," says Col. Bryan addressing the Missouri legislature. We are feeling more optimistic about it since the incarceration of Mrs. Chadwick.

Someone somewhere is getting agitated about the "Indian drink problem." On the theory that a "drunken Indian is the most irresponsible human being alive" it is urged to corral him as soon as he develops the habit and keep him a government prisoner. Evidently this young army officer, appointed and tolerated because of his grandfather, has not been cordially received in Washington.

A Leavenworth, Kansas judge has issued 8,300 marriage licences, married 3,100 couples and made out of the matrimonial business \$28,000. If he had added a divorce business on the side he might have retired by this time.

This is the season of the year that horse owners like to send their horses to the clipper where the long warm coat provided by nature is cut close to the skin, and it is the season when the horse owner puts on extra heavy underclothing and does his overcoat. There is a bill before Congress to prevent the sale in Washington of unregistered horses whose tails are cut off. The bill should also forbid the clipping of horses and of exposing them naked cold and wet weather.

A consular report from U. S. Consul Liefeld at Freiburg describes a German invention for making fishing easier. It consists of a microphone connected with a battery and a telephone and when the fish bite the telephone rings and then you pull in the fish. It is probably as effective and simple as sprinkling salt on a bird's tail, and its importance justifies our government in keeping consuls who will see that we are informed of the industry and progress of other nations.
