Geo. W. Elder Wrecked.

Portland, Or., Jan. 23.—The
Portland-San Francisco steamship
George W. Elder struck a sub-
merged rock in the Columbia river
about a half mile South of Goble
Saturday night at 10:30 and now
lies on the edge of the reef with
her bow hanging over 16 fath-
oms of water, while her stern points
toward shore and rests in six fath-
oms.

A terrible hole is torn in her bot-
tom just a little forward of amid-
ships on the port side. The water
is 15 or 16 feet deep in the boat's
hold, covering the gratings over the
engines and coming within four
feet of the main deck.

Salem, Or., Jan. 23.—Lands stolen
from the state, aggregating at least
\$100,000, have been disclosed in
the records of the State Land De-
partment, where 8000 acres have
been found to have been procured
from the state by what Attorney-

connected, thus involving that now
notorious character with state as
well as Federal land frauds.
