Hundreds May Quit.

A strike that is intended to tie up all the work on the Exposition buildings on the Lewis and Clark grounds, unless the demands of the carpenters at work there for \$3.50 for a working day of eight hours is granted, was begun today, when over 100 men employed on the Oregon Forestry, Festival Hall and Mines buildings walked out, declaring they would never return until their demands were granted.

Strikers declared that the men already out at noon today were only the advance guard, and that the walkout was but the beginning of what will be done unless their demands were complied with, and that the 300 or more men at work on the mainland at the Fair Grounds will all walk out today or tomorrow, and only waited this morning to see the different contractors and get their final decision in the matter of granting higher wages.

The average paid for carpenters on the various buildings being erected by the various contractors on the mainland was \$3 for nine hours' work. On Saturday the 400 men employed by Contractor J. E. Bennett, on the Government building, quit work, demanding \$3.50 for eight hours. This demand was acceded to and the men returned to work.

The contractors affected by the strike are the Burrell Construction Company, which is building the Forestry, Machinery and Festival Hall buildings; W. R. Griffith, who is constructing the Manufactures building, and E. A. Lynds, who has the contract for the Oregon building and the Mining building.

T. A. Rippey, superintendent for E. A. Lynds on the Oregon building, said: "Of the 16 men employed on the Oregon building, nine walked out at noon today, demanding \$3.50 for eight hours' work. We are now paying first-class carpenters \$3.50 a day, but the average is \$3 for nine hours. We would pay all \$3.50 if they were first-class men and could earn the money, but they cannot. We are paying the strikers off and expect to have no trouble in getting all the men needed to continue the work."

Further demands of the men are double pay for Sunday work, whereas they state they only get regular pay for Sundays, and pay and a half for overtime. W. H. H. Brady, who quit work on the Oregon building at noon today, said:

"We believe our demands are only just, and we will work hard to enforce them. Last night we took into Carpenters' and Joiners' Union, No. 1673, 65 new members. Practically all the workers on the grounds are now union men, and our plan is to organize every man in town and thus enforce our demands, if necessary."

Sultan Near Death's Door.

Berlin, Jan. 30.—Klein's Journal reports that Abdul Hamid II, Sultan of Turkey, is dangerously ill of inflammation of the muscles of the heart. In the event of his death the court clique intends that the sultan's younger brother, Rashid Bey, shall succeed him. Rashid Bey is said to be a hopeless drunkard.

Abdul Hamid II was born September 22, 1842, and ascended the throne August 31, 1876.

Bound Over.

Mark Whelpley, of North Bend, was taken to the county jail at Coquille yesterday to await the action of the next grand jury, on a charge of statutory rape, committed upon the person of a Miss Thomas, his 14 year old sister-in-law. The charge was preferred against him by the girl's sister, Mrs. Kreech, who caused him to be arrested and brought before City Recorder Chapman, where he waived examination and was bound over under \$800 bonds, which, being unable to furnish, he was, as mentioned above, remanded to the county jail to which he was escorted by North Bend's city marshal, Mr. Shaw.—Coast Mail.
