**Finest Steamer Ever in the Bay.**

The big passenger steamer Roanoke, the largest vessel ever crossing the Coos Bay bar, arrived in this port yesterday morning from Frisco via Eureka. On the trip up to the latter port the Roanoke easily overhauled and passed the Pomona, bound for the same port, which had left San Francisco one hour and fifteen minutes previous to the Roanoke's sailing. This is quite a distinction as the Pomona has long been considered one of the fleetest craft sailing north from Frisco.

The Roanoke was built by the famous shipbuilder, John Roach, at Chester, Pa., in 1882 and was owned by the old Dominion S. S. Co., and ran out of New York for many years. The steamer's gross tonnage is 2,354 tons; she is 295 feet long over all, 40 feet beam, and draws 15 light and about 20 feet loaded.

The steamer is luxuriously furnished throughout, making the passenger accommodations of the best. Of these there are first and second class and steerage.

The master of the Roanoke, Capt. Robt. J. Dunham, is well known here on the bay, having been born in Coos county, leaving here on his first voyage some years ago as second mate on the steamer Homer. A. Dunham, brother of the captain, is chief engineer, and the other officers are J. Spencer, 1st officer; E. H. Heckman, second; E. A. Clark, third; Mr. Close, steward.

Harry Ozouf, the San Francisco agent of the company, came up as purser for this trip. The Roanoke is the property of the N. P. S. S. Co., and C. E. Doe, one of the owners is aboard this trip.

Wharfage has been leased of F. S. Dow, and the agency will be placed in the competent hands of H. M. Bronson, who will go to Portland on the vessel this trip. The Roanoke will make regular trips from San Pedro to Portland via San Francisco, Eureka and Coos Bay, and it is the intention to make the round trip every 14 days.—Mail.
