Senator Says "Not Guilty."

Senator Mitchell, commenting on the new indictment returned against him made the following statement:

"When Francis J. Heney gets through with his character-blackening process, and court shall meet in April, I shall be on hand, if living and well, in Portland to meet in the open, before court and jury. Heney and his allies and all accusers and accusations which in anywise seek to connect me with any land frauds, bribery or other offense. Of the final outcome I have not the slightest fear, but in the meantime I assert in the most positive manner: I never in my life had any conversation with Frederick A. Kribs in reference to any lands or any other business matter."

"I am equally positive in the statement that I never received from Kribs or from any other person for him, directly or indirectly, any check or checks for any amount whatever, either on the Roseburg Bank or any other bank, in consideration for any services rendered or to be rendered by me as Senator or for any purpose whatever."

Senator Mitchell says he welcomes searching investigation of every charge against him, saying nothing but distorted and misconstrued innocent acts of his, "sought to be supported by the testimony of convicted felons," can connect him with land frauds.

He says Kribs never contracted with him for the service of A. H. Tanner and himself to appear for him before the Land Office, because his partnership with Tanner stipulated that he (Mitchell) could not be interested in department business.

Plot to Kill.

Berlin, Feb. 7.—The Tageblatt reports that a plot against the czar's life was discovered by Emperor Nicholas himself. His Majesty was walking through the corridors of the Tsarskoe Selo yesterday, when he noticed a letter addressed to himself lying on the floor. He picked it up and found that it contained an announcement that twelve men had sworn to kill him in revenge of the St. Petersburg massacre of January 22nd.

The letter caused great excitement throughout the place, and elaborate precautions were immediately taken to protect the czar, who has not left the place since.

The same paper announces that more fighting has occurred at Warsaw between troops and strikers, in which several were killed and wounded.

Failure to Turn Japanese Flank

St. Petersburg, 7.—The attempt to turn the Japanese left flank inaugurated by by Kuropatkin on Jan. 25th is now definitely regarded as a failure.

It is stated on reliable authority that Kuropatkin has requested that 46,000 reinforcements be sent immediately.

The authorities are considering, however, the transport difficulties involved in getting this number of troops to Mukden.

London, Feb. 7.—The highest authority is claimed by the St. Petersburg correspondent of the London Daily Chronicle for the statement that the grand-ducal party has decided that Russia must sue for peace.

At the Russian embassy it was asserted that there was no basis for the report that peace proposals had been made, and that Russia could not consider such proposals under present condition.

The Oregon state Senate has voted to adjourn on February 17, at not later than six o'clock. The following resolution was also unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That we declare our continued faith in the honesty, honor and integrity of our senior Senator, Hon. John H. Mitchell, and that we at this time extend to him a vote of thanks for the 22 years of faithful service by him rendered to our state and nation, and that we hereby record our hope and belief that his good name and the fair name of our state will be cleared from any charge of any nature whatsoever."
