**A Rare Relic.**

E. A. Franklin, superintendent of the county farm, has left with us for a few days an exceedingly rare relic like which there are but few in existence. It is in the form of a small glass sauce dish, one of a number of which were caused to be manufactured by a number of the leading ladies of the country at that time and one presented to each of the soldiers who survived the famous battle of Bunker Hill. The inscription it bears is "From the Fair to the Brave. Bunker Hill Battle, June 5, 1775." This particular dish was presented to a Revolutionary soldier by the name of Hubbard—his first name has been lost to Mr. Franklin's family. His widow, when a very old lady, gave it to Melissa Winters on her seventh birthday. She gave it to her niece, Mattie C. Warren on her seventh birthday, and she, in turn, gave it to her daughter, Edna M. Franklin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Franklin, at the age of seven. This keepsake has been in the family of Mrs. Franklin for about 70 years, and no small sum of money would be any temptation for it. There is being a receptacle made for the dish in which it will be sent to the Lewis and Clark exposition this summer.
