While we are reading of the intense cold in other sections of this country which are on a direct parallel with this country, and the terrible suffering of the people and perishing of stock, we are enjoying almost summer-like weather. While we had a number of white frosts during January and the forepart of February, vegetation seems to have suffered very little. Roses have bloomed right along in the open gardens, dandelions have blossomed all winter long, and grass stands a foot high or more in yards where it has not been eaten off by stock. We have not seen a flake of snow yet this winter, and from the present indications, we should judge that it is very likely we will not see any this winter, as it seems from all appearances that our winter has broken. We have seen eldersprouts which have come forth in the past two weeks as much as two or three inches in length, and the little garter snakes are creeping out for their sunbaths, which we regard as very good signs of approaching spring, while the laurel buds are swelling and look as these beautiful flowers will be blooming in a short time, and the gooseberry bushes are leafing out and many other shrubs and bushes budding out.
