Madison, Wis., Feb. 20.—Follow-
ing the example of the Kansas leg-
islature, the Wisconsin legislature
will soon take up the subject of the
Standard Oil Company. Two meas-
ures will be presented, one a joint
resolution for an investigation of the
methods of the corporation in Wis-
consin and the other a bill pro-
viding anti-trust legislation.

Kansas City, Mo., Feb. 20.—The
Missouri legislature may be asked
to take up the Kansas fight against
the Standard Oil Company. Repre-
sentative Leslie J. Lyons of Kan-
sas City, it is said, agreed to intro-
duce in the house at Jefferson City
the maximum freight rate bill and
the bill making oil pipe lines com-
mon carriers.

Guthrie, Okla., Feb. 20.—A bill
providing for a territorial oil re-
finery, has been prepared by Repre-
sentative McBride and will be pre-
sented in the House. The measure
will also, it is said, compel any cor-
poration operating in the Territory
to sell its product at an equal price
throughout the Territory.

Beggar Left \$400,000.

New York, Feb. 20.—Max Fiddler,
a Brooklyn quiltmaker, has learned
that he is heir to part of a fortune
of \$400,000 left by a beggar in
France, of whom Fiddler happened
to be a nephew. There are several
sisters of the quiltmaker, some of
them living in Odessa, who also re-
ceive a share.

died there last August at the age of
90 years. When his clothes were
removed the shabby receiver of alms
was found to have sewed in the lin-
ings drafts amounting to the sum
mentioned. A will was also found
bequeathing the entire sum to Baron
Rothchild.

When informed of his legacy, the
Baron assigned detectives to trace
the beggar's life and relationship.
It was found he had been kidnapped
from Odessa in childhood and had
become a professional beggar, which
he continued to be all his life.


