Oregon Development League.

Portland, Oregon, Feb. 27.—The Oregon Development League will hold a convention in this city, Tuesday and Wednesday, April 4th and 5th.

There are now fifty-one regularly organized bodies holding membership in the Oregon Development League, and this makes it the largest and best organized state body in the Union—there is no other state organization in the United States which can compare with it in completeness of representation.

The following towns, embracing every section of Oregon, are represented in the State League by local organizations: Albany, Arlington, Ashland, Astoria, Baker City, Burns, Condon, Corvallis, Cottage Grove, Dallas, Drain, Echo, Elgin, Enterprise, Estacada, Eugene, Fairview, Forest Grove, Grants Pass, Heppner, Harrisburg, Hillsboro, Hood River, Huntington, Independence, Ione, Irrigon, Jefferson, Joseph, Junction City, Klamath Falls, La Grande, Lebanon, Medford, Marshfield, McMinnville, Myrtle Creek, Newberg, North Bend, North Yamhill, Oakland, Ontario, Oregon City, Pendleton, Portland, Prineville, Roseburg, Salem, The Dalles, Union and Vale.

The general officers are as follows: President, E. L. Smith, Hood River; Secretary and Treasurer, Tom Richardson, Portland; Vice Presidents, F. J. Blakely, Roseburg; A. Bennett, Irrigon; F. W. Waters, Salem; J. H. Atkin, Huntington; J. Q. A. Bowlby, Astoria.

A reception will be tendered the League by the Portland Commercial Club. The railroad rates for the occasion will be announced later.

The active officers of the league are determined that this gathering shall result in a plan being decided upon that will insure all the different interests of Oregon being so represented on the grounds of the Lewis and Clark Exposition as to enable every visitor to get reliable data regarding any portion of this state upon any subject. Home-seekers are now visiting every part of Oregon and there will be many thousands coming here during the Fair, who will desire to investigate the different sections of the state, and it is the purpose of the League to be of assistance to such home-seekers.

A complete program is being arranged and will be given out later. A dollar dinner given by the members of the League has been discussed, but is not yet definitely decided upon.

Severe Losses for Russians.

Tien Tsin, Feb. 27.—Reports from the front via New Chwang say that the 11-inch mortars used by the Japanese in the bombardment of Mukden, caused great damage. Also that a general engagement is in progress with heavy fighting on the Japanese right. Kuroki is said to be threatening to crumple the Russians back onto the railroad. Mukden, Feb. 27.—In the fight for the possession of Da and Che passes Sunday the Russians were greatly outnumbered and sustained several losses. Some regiments lost as high as 70 per cent killed and wounded in the hand to hand struggle. At night the Russians were still in possession of the two passes.

Brave Chicago Policeman.

Chicago, Feb. 27.—On the street here today Daniel Herman, a policeman, shot and killed Miss Mulveil, a teacher in St. James' Parochial School. They met and exchanged angry words, when Herman drew his revolver, and deliberately pointing it at the woman, fired. Miss Mulveil fell dead. Herman escaped.

Ferryboat Sunk by Iceberg.

Cairo, Ill., Feb. 27.—The ferryboat Katherine, running between Cairo and Bird's Point, was struck today near here by a large piece of ice and sank in several feet of water. Many passengers were aboard the boat and a panic followed. All the passengers, after much difficulty, were taken off in safety.

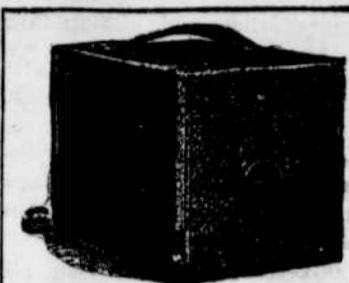
