

Thomas Wilson, Plaintiff, vs. Angus McDonald, Mary McDonald and John McDonald, Defendants.  
To John McDonald, one of the above named defendants:  
In the name of the State of Oregon, you are hereby notified that you are required to appear and answer the complaint filed against Angus McDonald, Mary McDonald, and yourself in the above entitled suit within six weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons, to-wit: Within six weeks from Friday, the 10th day of March, 1905, the same being the date of the first publication of this summons, and if you fail to so appear and answer on or before Saturday, the 22nd day of April, 1905, the same being the last day of the time prescribed in the order for the publication of this summons, for the last publication thereof, judgment and decree will be taken against the defendants in said suit for the relief demanded in the complaint in this suit, a succinct statement of which is as follows:
