Washington Will sue This State

E. C. McDonald, assistant attorney-general, of Washington, was in the city yesterday, in conference with Attorney-General Crawford, in the matter of the boundary line between the states of Oregon and Washington, and it was decided that Washington should bring suit against this state in the United States supreme court, making their allegations and claims that Oregon should then answer with her claims and allow the court to settle the question.

This matter has been under discussion between Fish Warden Van Dusen and the attorney-general for some time, and Mr. Van Dusen has at all times urged that it be settled. The troubles of an indistinct boundary have fallen mostly on his shoulders, the point in dispute being the Columbia river between Astoria and Portland. The boundary line is supposed to be the north ship channel of the river, but this kind of a line brings many difficult questions to solve. There are islands, which, at the present, no one knows which state they belong to, while it is understood that some of them have been sold by both states. Again fishermen are required to take out licenses in both states, and when arrests are made by Mr. Van Dusen or the state of Washington fish warden, they cannot get a conviction, for invariably the offender will produce a license from the other state, and swear that he was fishing under it.

The complaint to be filed against this state will be made up immediately, and the matter will probably be settled inside of six months. This matter is not a result of any ill feeling between the two states, but will be a friendly suit by which both states will be benefited. — Salem Journal.

May be Forced to sue for Peace.

St. Petersburg, March 15.—Prince Khikoff, the Minister of Public Work and Railways, in an interview on the subject of peace, said: "Personally, I should be glad to see an end of the war, but peace now is impossible. Since we received Kurapatkin's telegram relative to the situation there has been no reason for alarm. The question of peace could be solved by Semski Sobor, but this will not be summoned soon."

Paris, March 15.—It is understood that the large French banks will refuse to take up the new Russian war loan. In the event that they do, it is thought that the war will be brought to a speedy termination, and that Russia will sue for peace.

Steamer Tacoma Taken in.

Tokio, March 15.—The Tacoma, an American steamer, has been captured by a Japanese guard ship. The Tacoma was recently reported fast in the ice off Hokkado island. She was bound to Vladivostok with a cargo of beef.

Washington, March 13.—It is announced that the cases against Senator Mitchell and Representatives Binger Hermann and J. N. Williamson, for alleged complicity in land frauds, will be brought to trial in Portland early in June. District Attorney Heney, who secured the indictments, left for Oregon Saturday, after a conference with President Roosevelt and Secretary Hitchcock and Attorney-General Moody. Heney expects to secure a number of new indictments of prominent men on the coast.

Hitchcock assured the President of his ability to obtain convictions in the cases now pending. Senator Mitchell expects to arrive in Portland today.

Fierce Fire in New York.

New York, March 14.—In the most thrilling fire experience New York has had for many months, 19 lives were lost and 40 persons injured, a number fatally. Early today an East Side tenement was destroyed. Many of the tenement dwellers were roasted to death like flies on the cluttered fire escapes, while others jumped shrieking to the pavement before the eyes of the horrified spectators. Firemen and police officers threw themselves into the work of rescue with absolute abandonment of personal safety, and deeds of heroism were continuous. Many were rescued before the roaring furnace drove firemen away and consumed the remaining inmates.

The new National bank opened its doors yesterday. Mr. McFarland, the cashier, reports doing an exceptionally large amount of business for the first day.

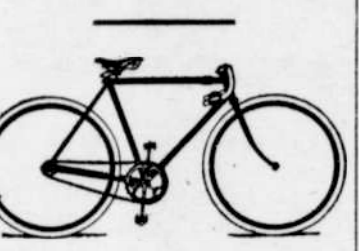
