(Coos Bay News.)

Miss Addie Jones, of Daniels creek, has been at the Horsfall hospital for the past few days, suffering from appendicitis.

The First National Bank of Coos Bay opens tomorrow in the El Dorado brick building.

Portland papers state that the owners of the Alliance are looking around for a larger vessel to take the place of the Alliance on the Portland-Coos Bay-Eureka route.

Kruse Bros. completed the necessary buildings at their logging camp, upper North Coos river, last week, and are opening up their camp and getting ready for hauling. They intend to put in 3,000,000 feet for the Simpson Lumber Company.

The first ball game of the season was played at North Bend, Sunday, between the Marshfield and North Bend teams, and was won by the home team, the score being 20 to 5. There was a good attendance from Marshfield, but the game was too one-sided to be very interesting.

The steamer Blanco has been purchased from L. J. Simpson by a San Francisco company of which Clyde Lightner is a member, and will be used in towing on San Francisco bay. She will be towed to the city by the steamer Signal. A crew of three will go below with the boat, consisting of Capt. Jas. Rooke, Thos. Rooke and Dave Morgan.

It is deplorable that the largest number of citizens of the United States who come together in the Capital of the Nation must come at a season of the year when the city is least attractive, and when it is most difficult for them to come. There has been again and again spasmodic effort to change the inauguration day from the Fourth of March to the Thirtieth of April, the day on which Washington assumed the first presidency of the United States. But it is so difficult to get Texas and Maine, Oregon and Florida and the intermediate states to pull together that this effort has signally failed. It would be a great advantage not only to the thousands who come to Washington to grace and enjoy the inaugural pageant and ceremony but also to the country if the short session beginning in November and cut short on the Fourth of March could continue two months longer and thus give Congress an opportunity for a more careful consideration of the important and increasing legislative business of the country.

In the name of the State of Oregon, you are hereby notified that you are required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit within six weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons, to-wit: within six weeks from the 10th day of March, 1905, the same being the date of the first publication of this summons.
