Oregon Apples Bring Highest Price of Any.

Oregon apples have commanded the highest price ever paid for any apples sold in the Eastern market. The fact is stated today by President E. L. Smith, of the Oregon Development League, who has just received advice from London that Hood River Newtown Pippins were selling there for 22s 6d per box, equivalent to \$5.43. At the same time a lot of 1600 boxes of Newtown Pippins sent to Edinburgh, Scotland, sold at 20s per box, equivalent to \$4.83, while apples grown in Scotland were selling at 1s 6d per box.

These prices are equivalent to about 7 cents each for Oregon apples, breaking records for prices for the fruit in foreign markets.

This information that Oregon apples excel those grown elsewhere is authentic, coming from the London dealers to whom the fruit was consigned by the Hood River Apple-Growers' Union, in an official communication to President A. I. Mason, of that organization. Occupying first place in the foreign market is regarded as one of the best advertisements it is possible to give to Oregon apples, for only the choicest fruit is desired for export, and a large amount of Oregon product is already consumed annually by the English people.—Telegram.

Water War Forced on

Klamath Falls, Or., March 17.—The Klamath Canal Company ordered the headgate of its canal opened on Link river, at 8 o'clock last night, and the water went coursing down the canal through the tunnel, under Aukney canal, down Eleventh street, in Klamath Falls, and out onto the flats bordering Lake Ewauna. At 10:30 o'clock this morning Sheriff Obenechain served the manager of the company with an order from the court directing him to shut off the water, because the property-owners on Eleventh street brought suit against the company for damages, as the Secretary of War had notified the company that taking water out of Link river would be illegal. The company will now undoubtedly have the attention of the United States District Attorney.

Sterling May Clean up \$25,000

Medford, March 14.—One of the few Southern Oregon hydraulic mines that has been supplied with water for continual operations this season, is the famous old Sterling, of Jackson county, near here, the property of H. E. and Levi Ankeny, and N. Cook, of Portland. It is believed that the output of the Sterling for the present season, despite the absence of rain, will be close to \$25,000, and may be greater even than that. This is a production of some 40 or 50 per cent on the amount invested, and only a small crew is required to operate the property. Five years ago the output of the Sterling was \$70,000. Plans were laid to eclipse that record this year but low water prevented.

Under Wheels of Engine.

Astoria, Oregon, March 17.—Captain S. F. Scott, of the Chetco, tripped while walking along the Astoria & Columbia River Railway track in Astoria last evening, lost his right leg and left foot, was thrown into the river, and was dead when picked up. He was on his way from the city to his gasoline schooner when the accident happened. The dead man was 55 years old, a native of Nova Scotia and a marine man of long experience.

Driven out by Plague.

New York, March 18.—Owing to the ravages of bubonic plague, not more than 500 inhabitants remain in the city of Pisagua, Chile, according to a dispatch from the Herald correspondent there. The place had a population of 20,000, but all who were able have fled. Only one doctor remains to attend to the sick, two others having fallen ill. There are 136 cases in the hospital. Twelve new ones were reported in one day, five resulting fatally.

The old Giles house which was purchased by Mr. R. Dement a year ago, is to be moved out to the Dement place and repaired for renting. A new livery stable is to be erected on the present site.

E. Garrett, the photographer is to open a branch gallery in Coquille.

F. Tichenor, with his usual energy, got out among our citizens and secured 27 new members for the Ladies' Improvement Club on Friday, St. Patrick's Day.

Never before in the history of the town has the 17th of March been so widely observed. The stores were tastefully decorated and the green was in evidence everywhere. Miss Ellen Tichenor, seven months old, is the youngest member of the club. The ladies gave a St. Patrick social at Leep's hall which was more than well attended and not half a dozen Irish in town. The program consisted of Irish songs and recitations, except one particularly fine duet sang by Miss Mable Green and Mrs. Yates. Mr. Gus Bender in his character song "The Undertaker" was excellent. In fact he is good in all his funny business. The refreshments were fully appreciated, as the returns show. The voting contest for the prettiest girl, at a penny a chance, netted over \$22 altogether. The ladies have cause to feel thankful for the substantial sum they had to add to the park fund, through the generous patronage given by our citizens.

Eckley and George Guerin started for Dawson, Alaska Monday from which place they will proceed to Last Chance, where George was located today. The young people tendered the travellers a farewell party at Smith's hall Saturday night, which was a very enjoyable affair.
