Electric Line on Peninsula

It was creditably reported this week that a street car line between North Bend and Marshfield has been decided upon.

This grows out of the recent purchase by Messrs. Waite and Shahan from the Flanagan estate the 620 acres of the property known as Centerville.

Sherman avenue will be extended through to Marshfield, and it is expected that Sherman avenue will become solidly built up between the two towns.

Details of the plan could not be completed until Mr. Shahan arrived on the bay.

This car line no doubt would become part of a system extending to Empire and around the bay.

With this street car service Empire would be the town to receive the great benefit. Passengers on the peninsula would go by street car to Empire and there take the boats.

This is only one of several investments that Mr. Shahan and Mr. Waite will make on the bay. They are now clearing up the obligations of the now defunct Belt Line company.

Chas. Coddling and others will relinquish their attachments on the Empire dock and receive their money.

Mr. Diers will also relinquish his contract for the purchase of this dock and he will be reimbursed for his outlay.

In connection with the deal Mr. Vigness will announce the creation of several cottages in the Bangor addition.

The deeds for the Flanagan property were sent off last Saturday to Coquille to be recorded.

The Flanagans will have a valuable ten acres around the old Centerville dock. The perpetual rights of the Marshfield water company are also assured in the reservation of forty acres including the reservoir on Pony inlet.

It is probable that those holding contracts on Plat A will now get their deeds.

Major Kinney is said to retain nothing whatever out of the wreck of his operations.

Judge Shelbreds upon his resignation as secretary of the Belt Line took up the work of collecting claims amounting to some six thousand dollars against the Belt Line. He was succeeded as secretary by W. W. Graves.

Mr. Waite has been the recipient of many congratulations upon his having got his hand out of "the lion's mouth."

He and Mr. Shahan have secured a most valuable property if Coos bay goes ahead.

The settlement of this affair is cause for congratulation all around. The shape things was in has long retarded the development of the bay.—Harbor.

A delegation of Ute Indians has visited Washington to protest against the opening of their reservation to white settlers. The President declined to accede to their wishes, and, in reply to his refusal, one of the braves asked that he be permitted to locate in some forest reserve as far away from the white man as possible. The President was obliged to refuse even this request, although he might have considered it, had he recalled the famous "seven-eleven" land in Oregon.

Testimony regarding that portion of our forest reserves is all to the effect that there is very little danger of any encroachment from any more white settlers, and the "Indians" that discovered it are too busy keeping out of the Penitentiary ever to bother the Utes if they were to go there.—Oregonian.
