

Monmouth Normal Alumni Association.

The Oregon State Normal Alumni Association organized into a more compact body in June 1904. They placed county secretaries in each county who are to co-operate with the executive board in making a compact state organization.

The old Christian College graduates were made honorary members of the Alumni. There are some 70 members of this parent institution.

The school has graduated 670 members, of whom over 70 per cent are teaching. Multnomah is represented with 70 graduates, while in Coos county there are 12.

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No News From the Front.

London, Mar. 29.—A Times, St. Petersburg correspondent telegraphed as follows: "The entire absence of the press and private telegrams from the front, together with the laconic message from General Linevitch dated Harbin, which says: 'No reports from the armies,' evokes the fear that communications have been cut and that the Japanese have turned the Russian flank."

St. Petersburg, Mar. 27.—As a consequence of the decision to send the guards regiments to the war, the soldiers are mutilating themselves in order to escape service. It is said that some of the guards have cut off their fingers and others have used drugs to produce palpitation of the heart. Hundreds of such cases have been discovered, and an investigation is in progress.

Albany Woolen Mills Burn.

Albany, Or., Mar. 29.—The Albany Woolen Mills were destroyed by fire this morning and the entire plant is a total loss.

The flames started in the drying room and were carried by the main driving belt through the mill, spreading so rapidly that the operatives barely had time to escape with their lives.

Simon to Defend Hermann.

Portland, March 27.—Hon. Joseph Simon will appear for Congressman Hermann in the land fraud cases. Mr. Simon is very confident that there is no case whatever against his client. Simon is not retained in any of the other cases.

It would be interesting to learn, if it were possible, how many of the farmers in Oregon who are making a business of selling cream or milk to creameries on the butter fat basis know anything about the results of the great test at the St. Louis Exposition. We fear that a very large majority neither know nor care. That stolid ignorance and indifference is a sort of protection, however to the dairy farmer who knows what is going on both in the world and in his own dairying operations. The men who know nothing about dairy tests, etc., are very apt to also know very little about the profits or losses they are making on the cows in their own herds.—Or. Agriculturist.
