(Coos Bay News.)

The buy steamer Blanco, lately purchased by San Francisco parties, left for the city yesterday in tow of the steamer Signal. Capt. James Rooke, Dave Morgan and a sailor composed the crew of the Blanco.

The log jam on the East fork of North Coos river was broken last night, and altogether about 8,000 logs were floated to the main river.

Hugh McLain arrived last week from Portland, where he had just finished three sewer contracts. His bid was accepted last night by the city council and he has secured the contract for building a mile of sewers in District B.

The latest in regard to the route mapped out for the little steamer Toledo, is that she is to run between Gray's Harbor and Portland and operate alternately south of the Columbia. This would give her a chance to make two trips a month between Portland and points as far south as Coquille.

The excelsior mill, which had been shut down for the past month, started up again yesterday, and J. F. Bingham says it will run steadily from now on. He hopes, within a short time, to put on an extra crew and will then run day and night, thus doubling the output. There is a good demand for all the excelsior he can turn out, and an enlargement of the plant is contemplated.

Suit in Equity for Divorce.

To Mary E. Waite, the above named Defendant:

In the name of the State of Oregon, you are hereby notified that you are required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit within six weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons, to-wit: within six weeks from the 10th day of March, 1905, the same being the date of the first publication of this summons.

And if you fail to appear and answer on or before the 21st day of April, 1905, the same being the last day of the time prescribed in the order of publication, the plaintiff will take judgment against you and will apply to the court for the relief demanded in his complaint, a succinct statement of which is as follows: That the marriage contract existing between plaintiff and defendant may be set aside and held for naught and that plaintiff be restored to all the rights and privileges of a single person, and for such other and further relief as the court may deem equitable and just.

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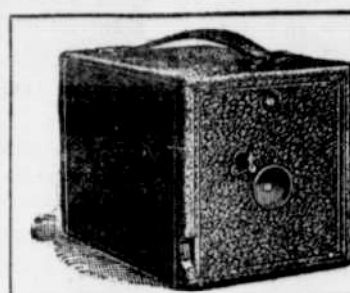
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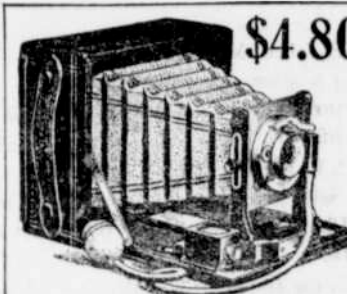
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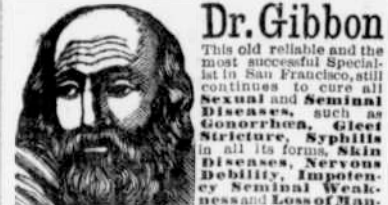
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
