Fifteen Indicted.

Indictments were voted this afternoon by the United States Grand Jury against State Senator R. A. Booth, manager of the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company; his brother, Henry J. Booth, Receiver of the Roseburg Land Office; Frank D. Alley, of Roseburg, abstractor; A. R. and Edward R. Downs, Seattle timbermen; Rev. Stephen W. Turnell, a Roseburg minister; Edward Singleton, brother-in-law to the Booths; Willard N. Jones, a Portland timberman; Thaddeus S. Potter, formerly clerk in the land office of F. P. Mays; H. L. Sissler, of Seattle; Daniel Clark, an ex-soldier of the Rebellion; Clarence B. Zachary, Colonel D. Barnard and Charles A. Wetson, of Fossil, Wheeler County. The present grand jury will adjourn this afternoon or this evening sine die and the next act in the great land fraud drama of Oregon will be the first trial since the sensational case heard before Judge Charles B. Bellinger, of the United States Court, last Fall. United States District Attorney Heney will prosecute.—Evening Telegram.

The information board that it is proposed to establish in connection with the Chamber of Commerce will no doubt prove of practical value in the development of the state. It will furnish ready reference, so to speak, to persons who come thither with the purpose of making Oregon their home. That is to say, it will provide a place where necessary information as to business opportunities, professional openings, desirable farming and fruit lands, etc., may be obtained without expending time and money about the state, which necessarily involve expense and loss of time. It will, moreover, show an interest in newcomers that is especially commendable, and that persons coming into a new community greatly appreciate. The policy or disposition of Oregonians has been to rest content in their own knowledge of the special advantages that the state offers to industry, trade and development. There has been no studied neglect of strangers, but an indifference that amounts to neglect has been often noted. A step to overcome this is a step in the right direction.—Oregonian.

Big Railroad Merger.

New York, April 7.—A line of railroad from the Atlantic to the Pacific, under one management, that dream of transportation leaders for many years, will be an accomplished fact in a short time, according to the opinion of a number of well-known financiers. Under the direction of J. Pierpont Morgan & Co. and Kuhn, Loeb & Co., the underwriting of this vast enterprise, which dwarfs the Northern Securities merger by comparison, is well under way, and Wall street is expecting a successful report in a short time.

The railroad systems involved in this combination are the New York Central and the many lines it controls, including the Lake Shore, Michigan Central, West Boston & Albany, Big Four and a number of smaller lines; the Chicago & North Western system and the Union Pacific, controlling the Southern Pacific, the Oregon Railway & Navigation Company and the Oregon Short Line. Their aggregate mileage is more than 30,000, and the value of their combined capital stocks presents a startling array of millions.

The profits of the tobacco trust last year were \$22,228,182, and this institution is credited with a surplus of nearly \$30,000,000. Now that "trust-baiting" has become a favorite pastime, it might be a good plan to put the tobacco trust on the rack. Tobacco is not one of the necessities of life, but is so universally used that the consumers perhaps should not be held up and robbed by the exorbitant demands of the trust. This is another of the tariff-fed infant industries which already does something more than sit up and take notice. By hammering down the raw material and increasing that of the manufactured article, the tobacco trust has an unbeatable system for working "both ends against the middle."—Oregonian.

Joseph Hudson Laid to Rest.

Joseph Denman Hudson was born in Cass county, Michigan May 15, 1834, and died in Coquille, Oregon, April 6, 1905, at the age of 70 years, 10 months and 24 days. He came to Oregon with his father and other members of the family, crossing the plains in 1847. In 1848 the family settled on the Clatsop plains near the mouth of the Columbia river. During the mining excitement in California in 1849, he with his brother Shad went to the golden state but returned a year later and settled in the Umpqua country. He was married to Miss Margaret Wheeler April 18, 1867, and to this union were born eight children, 3 boys and 5 girls, all of whom are living. He moved with his family to Coos county in 1876, and has lived in Coquille City about 15 years.

The deceased took an active part in several campaigns against the hostile Indians in different parts of the territory in an early day, and was on the Indian war veterans pension roll at the time of his death.

In the passing away of Mr. Hudson Oregon loses one of its early pioneers, and Coos county an honorable and upright citizen, the family a kind and loving husband and father. The family were all present at the funeral except Mrs. Jackson, who lives in Douglas county and who did not receive the message in time on account of the wires being down. His brother, Uncle Shad and Mrs. Divelbiss came up from Port Orford, arriving in sight of the home just as he was breathing his last, while Mrs. Tanner got in a few hours later from her home at Aberdeen, Washington. While Joe and Mrs. Fennan came in from Roseburg. The family have the heartfelt sympathy of the entire community.

The funeral services were conducted by Rev. C. M. Branham, and the body laid to rest in the Masonic cemetery.
