Madrid, April 8.—Four hundred
persons were killed or injured today
by the collapse of a new water reser-
voir in course of construction. Fifty
to six have already been recovered.
The Prince of the Asturias, the War

have gone to the scene to superin-
tend the work of rescue. Troops
sent to the spot are engaged in help-
ing the sufferers and recovering
the bodies of the dead. The catas-

to the scene.

you are hereby notified that you are re-
quired to appear and answer the com-
plaint filed against you in the above
entitled suit within six weeks from the
date of the first publication of this sum-

10th day of March, 1905, the same be-
ing the date of the first publication of

And if you fail to appear and answer
