CHANGE IN MAIL ROUTE.

Coquille to be Terminus of Route No. 73356.

We give below a letter from Second Assistant Postmaster General W. S. Shallenberger in regard to our petition, asking a change in our mail services, which is self-explanatory, and which was received by O. C. Sanford, secretary of our board of trade. The letter reads as follows:

Post Office Department.
Washington D. C., April 5, 1905.
Sir: In connection with the letter from this office under date of February 13, 1905, acknowledging the receipt of your letter, forwarding a copy of the petition for the extension of services on route, No. 73356, Roseburg to Myrtle Point, Oregon, so as to end at Coquille, I have to inform you that the matter has been made the subject of careful consideration on the part of this office.

It has been found that mail is now being delayed at Myrtle Point, and in order to provide direct services between Roseburg and Coquille an order has this day been issued extending route 13356 to end at the latter office, which is in accordance with the suggestions contained in the petition.

The question of changing the schedules for service on routes 73356 and 73100, Myrtle Point to Bandon, has been considered, but it is not deemed advisable to materially change the schedules under the existing contracts. However, the matter will be given careful consideration in connection with the preparation of the advertisement for service during the next contract term, which begins July 1, 1906.

The extension of service on route 73356 will provide for a through service between Roseburg and Coquille in sixteen and one-fourth hours during the period from June 16 to October 15, of each year, and of twenty-five and one-half hours during the period from October 16, to June 15, of each year; the carriers starting from each end of the route at 6 a. m.

The delay in the handling of the mail at the Roseburg office, as referred to in the petition; has also been given consideration by the Department, and it has been reported that arrangements have been made whereby the cause for delay of mail at Roseburg has been resolved.

The re-organization of the Canal Commission is at last an accomplished fact and it is believed that the new men will be stronger and more effective as they are nearly all younger than those whom they have succeeded.
