Any person who has lived in the Willamette Valley for twenty years past can easily recall the days when big red apples, sound to the core and free from worms, grew in every farmer's orchard. The trees, once planted, were left in the early days to care for themselves. No spraying was done, nor were the pruning shears brought into use from year's end to year's end. Then the codling moth and other pests came. The Willamette Valley farmer, accustomed to see his apple trees thrive and bear untended, failed to grasp the seriousness of the changed conditions, and in a few years sound apples became almost unknown. Within recent years the rehabilitation of many of these orchards has been undertaken, and results are already beginning to show. There are now many first-rate orchards in the Willamette Valley. But they are the results of constant, painstaking work, and they are still the exception and not the rule. The days when good apples would "raise themselves" have gone, never to return. The Willamette Valley can regain its lost prestige as the great apple-producing district of the North-west, if proper and united effort to that end be made. Otherwise Hood River valley will continue to raise the good, sound apples and to carry off the honors.—Telegram.

### Titles Depend on Decision.

Salem, Or., April 11.—The question of whether the State Land Board has authority to cancel certificates of sale and deeds to state school lands in which fraud appears upon the face of the application came up directly before the board this morning when James K. Sears made application for the purchase of 320 acres of timber land in this county, sold as school land to Fred Palmer, of this city, March 14, 1901. In the application Sears alleges that he believes the application by Palmer was fraudulent in that he did not purchase the land for his own use and that the certificate of sale was assigned to W. D. Mohney, who is said to have furnished money for the first payment.

The question whether the board has power to cancel certificate cases of this kind has been submitted by the Governor to the Attorney-General, who will render an opinion in a few days. In case the Attorney-General concludes the board is vested with this power, the Governor is prepared to demand the cancelling of a large list of certificates and deeds, aggregating over 500,000 acres.

The state grand jury moved to the State House this afternoon, where records are convenient, for the purpose of entering into a thorough investigation of land matters. It is said every transaction in which an application was filed will be taken up, including alleged lieu land scandals of the past administration.

### Guarding Against Leprosy.

Seattle, April 11.—The immigration officers of Puget Sound ports refuse to allow passengers on vessels touching Honolulu to land, fearing a spread of leprosy as a result of the recent action of the Hawaiian legislature on violation of the immigration laws.

A junketing party of 400 persons recently visited the leprosy colony at Molokai Island, and mingled freely with the lepers, taking no precaution against spreading the disease. The action of the legislature has been reported to the government at Washington.

### Case Continued.

The case of the state with E. S. Gordon, of North Bend, for threatened murder and assault with dangerous weapon, was called in Recorder Chapman's court yesterday afternoon and it was decided to continue the case until next Monday at 2 p. m.

Mr. Gordon is accused of having threatened to take the life of L. J. Simpson and with making an assault with a deadly weapon upon the person of L. F. Falkenstein. He was arrested a day or so ago but was released upon bail.—Coast Mail.

The Mormons have bought an old jail in Illinois and are fitting it up for a home.

### Accident Drowning.

Chris Thompson, 2d assistant engineer of the steamer Alliance, fell overboard and was drowned yesterday evening about 9:30. The vessel was lying at the warehouse dock, when Thompson, who had been down town, approached the gangway with the intention of going on board. Capt. Hardwick and first officer Olson were on the upper deck, and heard a splashing in the water, as if someone was struggling. Capt. Hardwick threw a life-ring overboard, and the mate got on the dock and from there to the guard rail as quickly as possible, but there was no sign of the missing man. It is supposed that Thompson, while attempting to board the steamer, missed his footing, and in falling struck his head against the rail, which rendered him unconscious. Attempts were made at once to recover the body, but were not successful until this morning, when it was found close to the place where he fell overboard. A bruise over the right eye sustains the theory that he struck against the ship in falling; his mouth was also cut.—Thompson was an American, about 35 years old, unmarried, and his home was in San Francisco.—Coos Bay News.

### Poultry Notes.

Early pullets are the profitable winter layers. Feed what the fowls will eat up clean and no more.

Poor care and lack of feed will make mongrels of any breed. Too fat hens are sure to blame for many poor hatches.

Breed only from perfect fowls. The defective bird will transmit its faults.

Keep plenty of litter for the hens to scratch in and renew it often enough to keep it clean.

The active, fiery-looking bird is the one to put in the breeding pen, other things being equal.

It is a good rule to fatten and market all 2 year-old hens as soon as they finish laying.

The male bird is half of the flock. A mistake in selecting in this respect is a mistake that reaches the whole season's output.

Make the hen scratch for her food. She will enjoy it, pursue it vigorously, and will lay as a consequence of the healthy condition produced.

When pure bred stock is kept, all the best breeders can be disposed of at a good profit to other breeders. Farmers take notice of this fact.

No farmer objects to feed cattle or hogs. A flock of hens will pay a higher price for the grain they eat than any other kind of stock.

Poultry raising, like dairying, the raising of fruit, hogs or cattle, has become a science. Anyone to be successful, must make this business a study, as he would any other.

Many an old hen who has outlived her usefulness is kept year after year, because the owner, through neglect, has not learned that she is eating five times as much as all the eggs she produces are worth. Send such fowls to market at once.—Homestead.
