The Daughters of the American  
Revolution are to hold their annual  
congress in Washington this month.  
The sessions promise to be interest-  
ing to the fighting sisterhood inas-  
much as the season has again ar-  
rived when a president will be  
elected. This is a signal for all  
the fighting blood of their ances-  
tors to assert itself and anyone who  
has watched the daughters elect a  
president can never again doubt the  
legitimacy of their claim to be de-  
scendants of Revolutionary heroes.

office there was actually no blood  
spilled but there were gowns ruined  
and feathers flew from the hats.

a candidate for the presidency of  
the United States is a tame affair  
compared to the mixed melodrama  
and vaudeville performance which  
attends the election of a presidency  
of the Daughters of the Revolution.

of his speeches: "A man who is  
good enough to shed his blood for  
the country is good enough to be  
given a square deal afterward.  
More than that no man is entitled  
to and less than that no man shall  
have."

## NOTE AND COMMENT.

men is in revolt in the forests near  
Sanchez, in the Island of Santo  
Domingo". Our brave soldiers who  
are en route there should not let  
this terrify them.

The Foreign Missions has at last  
decided to accept Mr. Rockefeller's  
gift but it has succeeded beyond its  
expectations in preventing other  
benefactors from bestowing upon  
them fortunes which are open to the  
accusation of being tainted.

President Roosevelt says "I have  
left Taft sitting on the lid keeping  
down the Santo Domingo matter."  
The people need no better assur-  
ance than this that a senator or two  
will not come along and puff it off  
for the Secretary weighs over three  
hundred pounds.

The Interstate Commerce Commit-  
tee of the Senate will take up con-  
sideration of the railway rate bill  
this month at special sittings to be  
held in Washington. By the time  
Congress convenes they will have  
enough information on the subject  
to keep Congress busy considering  
it all winter and we may expect to  
see the adjournment without action  
in the summer.

The people of Texas have made  
up their minds to destroy the trusts  
in that state. They have appropri-  
ated fifteen thousand dollars for the  
purpose, just about the amount  
that the trust spends on a stand up  
lunch at some of its conferences as  
to how the state can be most easily  
manipulated.

If Judge Taft shall be the Repub-  
lican Presidential candidate the ex-  
perience he is now requiring will  
not be disadvantageous to his candi-  
dacy or to his incumbency of the  
great office if he should be elected.  
For the present he has the three fold  
responsibility of President pro tem,  
Secretary of State and Secretary of  
War. The President recently pleas-  
antly described him as "sitting on  
the lid," fortunately not of a vol-  
cano; but those who have had a  
visual suggestion of Secretary Taft's  
immense weight will think him ca-  
pable of holding down the lid of  
an average volcano. Mr. Taft is  
well equipped for his manifold role.  
He has the business of the War De-  
partment well in hand. Under his  
direction it moves like a well-drilled  
squadron. His experience in the  
Philippines and his negotiations in  
Italy with the Pope showed him to  
be a statesman and a diplomat of  
no mean capacity, and his presene  
at the council table of President  
Roosevelt has familiarized him with  
our immediate international rela-  
tions. He has as much serenity of  
mind as Mr. Hay while his legal edu-  
cation and experience has qualified  
him for the highest judicial office  
in the country.
