Gallows for Adolph Weber.

Auburn, Cal., April 13.—Adolph Weber was today sentenced to be hanged June 30 for the murder of his mother.

The court denied the motion, and the prisoner's demeanor altered perceptibly at the decisions. He turned pale when ordered to stand up, and refused to do so, saying, "What for?" despite the arguments of his counsel.

Attorney Tuttle asked for a modification of the order to allow Weber to stay in jail here, pending the perfecting of the appeal, and it was granted. Thirty days were also granted to prepare the statement.

Transfer Money by Cable.

The Western Telegraph Company has extended its money transfer service to foreign countries. The local Western Union office will accept money to be transferred by cable to all points in Great Britain, and Ireland, France, Switzerland, Germany, Austria, Hungary, Italy, Sicily, Spain, Portugal, Belgium, Holland, Denmark, Sweden, Russia in Europe, Roumania, Servia, Greece, Corsica, Sardinia and all other countries in Europe.

Before Judge Hamilton, in this city, Wednesday afternoon, Attorney Chas. Bruneau, of Portland, representing the Oregon Anti-Saloon League, argued an application for dissolution of the injunction issued by Judge Hamilton, restraining the County Court of Coos County from issuing an order of prohibition.

Judge Hamilton has taken the application under advisement. The injunction is only a temporary one, Judge Hamilton having issued it during a vacation term of the circuit court at Corvallis last January. The case was to have been tried on its merits at the regular term of the Coos County Circuit Court, which convenes at Coquille on the last Monday of this month.
