for the real ones, and all the delic-

been sold and the money pocketed
by some of the officials, military or
civil, having them in charge.

German merchants are asking
their government to move for the
introduction of an international
postage stamp. The merchants say
that letters from abroad frequently
remain unanswered because return
postage is not inclosed. The adop-
tion of this proposal would be one
of those little improvements that
count for a great deal. Persons
with correspondents in other coun-
tries would find such a stamp of the
greatest convenience.

a lassing match, was carried out at
an informal party given recently at
the Executive Mansion by Mr. and
Mrs. J. H. Mickey. The first thing
on the program was a hunt by the
gentlemen for the ladies who were
hidden in the various rooms with a
general "roundup" in the halls.
The crowd of fair femininity was
then driven to the "roseland agency,"
in other words, to the ballroom on
third floor. Here the final fun be-
gan. Each man took his turn at
lassing a partner for supper in the
order of the number he had pre-
viously received. The whole plan
was a great success, but could scarce-
ly be carried out satisfactorily in
an ordinary house lacking ballroom
facilities.—Nebraska State Journal.

In arranging the terms of the sur-
render of Port Arthur the Japanese

course has been French.

Blizzard at Camp Roosevelt.

Denver, Colo., April 16.—A news
special from Newcastle, Colo., says
that a fierce blizzard rages at Camp
Roosevelt, 25 miles south of there,
today. So violent was the storm
that no one ventured out of doors.
The greater part of the day was
spent by the President and party
around the camp fires telling hunt-
ing yarns.

The News also has a dispatch
saying that the mail carrier, who
covers the territory adjacent to
Huntsman Hills, reached Newcastle
today and verified the report that
the President killed a large brown
bear with the first shot he fired yester-
day afternoon. It required sev-
eral hours' chase to bring the animal
to bay.

Railroad Survey.

The railroad survey crew is still
camped on the ridge north of Wilson
creek. It will take some time to com-
plete work in this county, we learn
Topographical work is being done
over quite a scope of country in the
neighborhood of Wilson creek, and
it may yet be necessary to fall back
to a point ten miles north of Cres-
cent City to procure proper grade.
Through work is done as the survey
proceeds southerly, and the work is
retarded in rough sections, such as
around Wilson creek.—Del Norte
Recorder.

Mandate in Merger Case.

Washington, April 17.—In accord-
ance with the previous announce-
ment by Chief Justice Fuller, the
mandate of the Supreme Court of
the United States in the Northern
Securities case was issued today.
It was directed to W. P. Clough,
chief counsel for the Securities
Company, and the essential part of
it is as follows:

"Whereas, in the present term
the cause came on to be heard be-
fore the Supreme Court and was
argued by counsel, it is now and
here ordered, adjudged and decreed
by this court that the decree of the
United States Circuit Court of Ap-
peals in this cause be and the same
is hereby affirmed with costs; and
that the said appellant, Northern
Securities Company, recover against
the said appellees \$20 for its costs
herein expended and have execution
therefor; and it is further ordered
that this cause be and the same is
hereby remanded to the Circuit
Court of the United States for the
District of New Jersey."

Eight Inch Gun Bursts on the Iowa

Washington, April 15.—The navy
department was informed this after-
noon by special from Pensacola that
an eight inch gun on the battleship
Iowa exploded during target prac-
tice, and the muzzle was blown off.
The gun had been fired 103 times.
