**Coquille Mill and Mercantile Company.**

The Lyons mill property having been purchased by W. T. Kerr, of this city, J. R. Benson, of Myrtle Point, and J. M. Nye, the well-known traveling man for several years past representing the firm of Murphy Grant & Co., of San Francisco, this branch of industry seems to have taken on new life, and it is believed, alive for keeps this time. The parties have seen fit to incorporate under the above firm name, and every detail has been fully carried out and the corporation starts off on a firm and solid foundation, every dollar of stock subscribed for being paid, a good lot of logs ahead and plenty of orders as well as a good local demand seems to be the conditions under which the institution starts off. The railroad's engineer has set the grade stakes for a new switch to take the place of the old one which had been removed, and Mr. Kerr has telegraphed for a vessel which will doubtless show up by the time a cargo of lumber can be cut. The mill began to run on regular time last Monday, and while a few minor breaks have occurred, there has been comparatively little time lost and seems to run very smoothly. Some new and improved machinery will be placed in the mill in the near future, and it is the intention of firm to rebuild the entire structure at no great distant day.

**Summons.**  
IN THE CIRCUIT COURT OF THE STATE OF OREGON, FOR THE COUNTY OF COOS.  
Thomas Wilson, Plaintiff,

Angus McDonald, Mary McDonald and John McDonald, Defendants.

To John McDonald, one of the above named defendants:  
In the name of the State of Oregon, you are hereby notified that you are required to appear and answer the complaint filed against Angus McDonald, Mary McDonald, and yourself in the above entitled suit within six weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons, to-wit:  
Within six weeks from Friday, the 10th day of March, 1905, the same being the date of the first publication of this summons, and if you fail to so appear and answer on or before Saturday, the 22nd day of April, 1905, the same being the last day of the time prescribed in the order for the publication of this summons, for the last publication thereof, judgment and decree will be taken against the defendants in said suit for the relief demanded in the complaint in this suit, a succinct statement of which is as follows:  
That the two mortgages set out in the complaint herein, and which were executed by the defendants, Angus McDonald and Mary McDonald, to the plaintiff, to secure the payment, respectively, of the two promissory notes which are also set out in the complaint herein, be foreclosed, and the premises described in said mortgages, to-wit: The E 1/2 of the SW 1/4, and the W 1/2 of the SE 1/4 of section 9 in township 29 south of range 12 west of Willamette meridian in Coos county, Oregon, excepting 66 acres, more or less from the above described premises, which has heretofore been sold and conveyed to parties other than the plaintiff, as shown by the records of deeds of Coos county, Oregon, be sold in the manner provided by law, and that the proceeds thereof be applied to the payment of the costs of said sale and of this suit, and the sums found to be due on said two promissory notes as secured by said mortgages, and that the defendants, Angus McDonald and Mary McDonald, and all persons claiming under them subsequent to the execution of said mortgages be barred, and foreclosed of all right, claim or equity of redemption in or to such premises.
