Celery Grower.

C. A. Brown, of San Francisco, and L. D. Burdick, of Jersey Island, Contra Costa Co., who are looking over the Coos Bay country, went up Coos river yesterday, accompanied by J. D. Johnson. Mr. Burdick is in business of raising celery for the San Francisco and Eastern markets, and has about 200 acres devoted to that succulent vegetable. He is looking this place over with a view to trying celery culture here, where it would be free from some of the serious drawbacks experienced in his present location. He was greatly pleased with what he saw yesterday, and it is to be hoped that he will conclude to give this profitable branch of market gardening a thorough demonstration here.

There is no doubt that there are several such lines in which any one who thoroughly understood the business could make a great success on our rich lands and in our even climate, and we want people to come here and show us how it is done.—Mail.

A reason for wheat being high now and continuing to be high next year is to be found in the large amount of flour being ordered by the Japanese, who are not only taking all the surplus of the coast but thousands of barrels from the far East, where daily orders of from 500 to 20,000 barrels are being received. One of the largest milling concerns of Minneapolis is thirty days behind with all their plants running to full capacity on Japanese orders.

A single vessel which will leave Portland at an early date for Japan will carry \$200,000 worth of flour.—Pacific Farmer.

Cannot buy Cigarettes.

Indianapolis, Ind., April 15.—(Special)—The acts of the General Assembly took effect late today, carrying with the Governor's proclamation the enforcement of the famous anti-cigarette law.

Local dealers anticipated the proclamation, and for several days have been shipping their stock to the trust, which agreed to take back all unsold. Cigarettes not made by the trusts have been sold by the wholesale price for several weeks, and tonight a cigarette could not be purchased.

At Princeton, Ind., one dealer burned \$200 worth in the street, and at Vincennes the stocks were given away when it became known that the law would take effect today. At many places merchants dumped their stocks into the sewers, and there is every indication that the law will be observed.

(Concluded from first page.) punishable by fine of \$20 to \$100 or imprisonment for 10 to 50 days, after May 18. The law on that subject declares that it shall be presumptive evidence of intent to defraud if any person shall fail to pay his bill on demand, unless he has made known in advance his inability to pay.

AFTER THE TICKET-SCALPERS.
The larceny of railway tickets, the forgery of railway tickets, and the "scalping" of railway tickets, are new crimes that have been defined by acts of the Legislature of 1905. The last of these, which will have effect upon a class of business now in operation, carries a penalty of \$100 to \$500 fine.

FOR PARENTS OF TRUANTS.
A fine of not to exceed \$1000 is provided as punishment for parents, guardians or other persons who are responsible for the delinquency of children. A "delinquent" child is defined to be a child under 16 years of age who violates state laws or city ordinances, or who is incorrigible, a persistent truant from school, who associates with criminals or vicious or immoral persons, or who is growing up in idleness, or who frequents gaming houses, houses of ill fame or places where intoxicating liquors are sold. The fine imposed may be suspended so long as the parent keeps his child under control.

The law relating to arson was amended so that the husband or wife may be guilty of burning the property of the higher.

CONSORTS' HEAVY PUNISHMENT

A term of one year to five years in the penitentiary or fine of \$1000 to \$5000 is provided as punishment for any male person who shall live with a prostitute, or live in whole or part of her earnings, or who shall solicit for a house of ill fame.

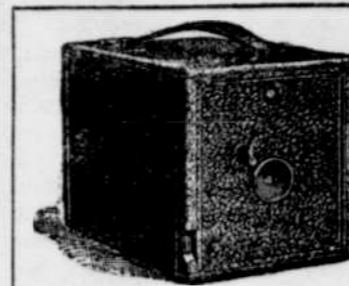
