

Togo Will Strike

Tokio, April 20.—That Admiral Togo, with the whole Japanese fleet, is to sail at once for Kamranh Bay, where Admiral Rojstvensky's fleet is still at anchor, and engage the enemy in a decisive battle...

The attitude of the French Government in giving shelter to Rojstvensky was declared a matter for serious after consideration. A dispatch states that Nebogatoff's squadron has reached Sudan Straits on its way to join Rojstvensky in the China Sea.

Ten Thousand Arrive.

New York, April 21.—Four trans-Atlantic steamers which arrived at the port today brought 9675 steerage passengers, the largest number ever passed in quarantine in one day.

Last night 62,791 immigrants had been landed this month, compared with 42,447 to the same date in April last year.

New York, April 21.—Plans have been completed in Wall street, according to the Herald, by which funds for the construction of the Western Pacific Railroad are absolutely assured. A syndicate of Wall street banking houses is stated to have agreed to buy \$50,000,000 worth of bonds from the company...

On its completion, the western Pacific will become an integral part of the Gould system from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and will complete the first line across the United States under one management.
