K. V. Kruse laid the keel last week for the 100-foot gasoline schooner he will build at his yard for San Francisco parties.

The Roanoke sailed Monday carrying 168 passengers, 26 from this port, for Portland. The Roanoke is building up a fine trade which vouches for her permanency on this route.

The steamer Kilburn is to sail north the 1st of May from San Francisco, where she is undergoing a general overhauling and having her cabins enlarged so that she can accommodate a large list of passengers. H. Sengstacken, agent, is authority for the statement that the Kilburn is on the route to stay, not withstanding the many reports to the contrary.

The Alliance took with her on her last trip to Portland, 30,000 feet of lumber, comprising the material for the frame and the exterior finish of the Coos county building at the Lewis and Clark fair. She also carried Contractor Turpen and a force of men, who will lose no time in getting the frame, which is already sawed together. The owners of the Alliance took up this 30,000 feet of lumber without charge. The remainder of the building material is to follow on the next Alliance and everything will be in readiness when the fair opens, June 1.

His foot slipped on the iron grating in the engine room, and Mr. Hansen being a heavy man, fell in such a way that both bones of the left leg, just above the ankle, were broken. We now have two ambassadors to the Court of St. James, one Acting and the other waiting. Ambassador Choate holds on while Ambassador Whitelaw Reid anxiously licks on. There is perhaps not on this planet a more desirable appointment than that of Ambassador to Great Britain. Many distinguished Americans have held the place, among them Buchanan, Revere, Johnson, Lowell and Bayard. Honors and social distinctions are showered thick upon the American representatives. Mr. Choate has just been elected Master of the Bench of the Middle Temple. Among English lawyers, this is the most distinguished honor that can be conferred on any outsider and it is the first time in several generations that such another than an English subject has been elected a Bencher of the Middle Temple, one of the oldest Inns of Court in London. Five signers of the Declaration of Independence were members of the Middle Temple, but since then until the election of Mr. Choate, no American has been a member. At a full meeting of Templars on the night of April 10, Mr. Choate was unanimously elected. When his name was proposed, another member moved that all standing rules and orders be suspended and the greatest enthusiasm was shown when the Ambassador was elected by unanimous vote.
