How to Carve a Turkey.

After the turkey is roasted trim drumsticks with paper ruffles, which will enable carver to touch them if necessary without soiling his hands. Place turkey on platter with the head at the left. Unless the platter is very large provide an extra dish, also a fork for serving.

- First.—Insert the carving fork across the middle of the breastbone.
Second.—Cut through the skin between the breast and the thigh.
Third.—Bend the leg over and cut off close to the body and through the joint.
Fourth.—Cut through the top of the shoulder down through the wing joint.
Fifth.—Shave off the breast in thin slices, slanting from the front of the breastbone down toward the wing joint.
Sixth.—Carve only from the side nearest to you.
Seventh.—Tip the bird over slightly and with the point of the knife remove the oyster and the small dark portion found on the side bone.
Eighth.—Then remove the fork from the breast and divide the leg and the wing.
Ninth.—Cut through the skin between the body and heart and with a spoon remove a portion of the stuffing.
Tenth.—Serve light and dark meat and stuffing as preferred.

If carved in this way the turkey will be left with one-half entire and if placed on a clean platter, with the cut side nearest the carver and garnished with parsley, will present nearly as fine an appearance to all but the carver as when first served. Where there are many to serve take off the leg and wing from each side and slice the whole of the breast before removing the fork, then divide as required.

Obesity Diet.

It is not the quantity of food, but the kinds of food eaten that fatten. This should be remembered when dieting to reduce flesh. "Semistarvation" as a means of reducing is not only weakening, but positively dangerous. The following diet list for the reduction of flesh is governed by common sense:

- Foods permitted are clams, oysters, lobsters.
Soups without flour or fat thickening.
Lean meats (ham, pork and liver excepted).
Fish—fresh, salt or smoked, of any kind, but cooked without fat or butter.
Eggs in any style.
Chicken, duck, turkey, game.
Vegetables—squash, string beans, carrots, tomatoes, turnips, cabbage, peas, onions, asparagus, cauliflower, celery, salads, watercress, pickles of all kinds.
Gluten bread.
Water, coffee and tea (except with meals).

WOMAN, 100 YEARS OLD, HAS A GREAT APPETITE

Mrs. Lovejoy First to Apply Under Recently Enacted Ashbrook Pension Law.

Newark, O.—Mrs. Mary A. Lovejoy, who is 100 years old, is the first woman in the United States to apply for a pension under the recently enacted Ashbrook pension law.

Mrs. Lovejoy is the widow of the late Samuel E. Lovejoy and was born on Oct. 26, 1816, at Frederick, Md., the name of Barbara Fritschie of civil war fame. Of her ten children four are living. They are Mrs. Elizabeth Kochendorfer, Perry and James Lovejoy of this city and George Lovejoy of Bellara. She has been a resident of this city for sixty-seven years. A year ago she fell and dislocated her hip, and there was apparently no hope for her recovery, but she rallied and is able now to walk any place she wants to go. She has a remarkable appetite. Often at a single meal she eats three eggs, four slices of bread, a pound of meat and a pint, and a half of coffee, with other things in the same proportion.

Fifteen years ago she became deaf, and the sight left her right eye at the same time, but she has never worn spectacles and can see to read ordinary print with her good eye just as well as ever she could.

Items From the Bay. (From the Coos Bay News.) E. W. Shrock and wife, of North Bend, will celebrate their golden wedding on Jan. 23. Twenty-two quarts of Old Shipper whiskey was found in casks, hung up under the Ocean dock, by Marshal Carter Monday afternoon. There is no clue as to the owner. At a recent meeting of the Port of Coos Bay renamed A. H. Powers, president, Peter Loggie, vice president; Henry Bengtackon, secretary; and A. O. Rogers, treasurer. At their meeting Monday night the city council agreed to allow the Coast Artillery to build an armory in the little park near the west end of Park avenue, provided it is built within a certain time limit. Several cargoes of lumber are to be shipped from North Bend mills to the Hawaiian Islands. In years gone by Simpson Bros. frequently shipped cargoes of lumber from North Bend to foreign ports. S. B. Cathcart, at Circuit court last week, was given a verdict for \$570. He asked damages of \$1,000 for injuries to his property in West Marshfield when the Mill slough section was filled by the dredge Seattle. J. P. Dunseth, of Portland, came over from the lower Coquille Friday, where he had been inspecting black sand deposits. He had with him quite a shipment of the sand, which he was taking to Portland to be tested for gold and platinum. A. P. Jones was here last week from the U. S. Navy Yard at Bremerton, Puget Sound, to inspect an order of white cedar which the government is getting from the G. A. Smith Co. The lumber is to be used for the finishing of motor boats. Miss Katie Sargent, of Bangor, has commenced suit in the Circuit court against N. J. Cousins for \$2,000 damages. She alleges that Cousins negligently drove his rig so that the wagon which her step-father, G. W. Stewart, was driving was upset, and that she suffered severe injuries when she was thrown out. Frank Ward, who had recently served 25 days in jail, was sent back to jail Friday morning for attacking George Riley, cook at Camp 7, the previous night. Ward blamed Riley for "peaching," in connection with his former arrest in a booze case, which Riley denied. Recorder Butler fined Ward \$60, or 30 days in jail. Albert Ahlquist, a resident of North Front street, was arrested Saturday by Marshal Carter on the charge of bootlegging. John Bingen, who was arrested and fined the previous day for being drunk, furnished the evidence on which the charge was based. Ahlquist's bachelor quarters were searched twice by the marshal, and 21 quarts of whiskey were found, which were taken to the police station. Recorder Butler fined Ahlquist \$75.
