## Teeth in Bone Dry Law.

"Except as he intoriesting liquor within this state; and the place of delivery of any in-toxicating liquor is hereby declared the place of sale; provided that it shall not be unlawful for any person possession of such person within this state at the time of the taking effect of this amendatory act, or lawfully obtained under the provision of this act."

Here is another provision of amended Section 6 of the same law which is intended to put an end to bootlegging by means of boats, autos or other ve
