### What Bandon Will Do.

Having been turned down by the S. P., the next move on Bandon's part should be to make arrangements to have a boat leave Coquille immediately on the arrival of the evening train, after the new schedule is in force. A strong searchlight will enable the boats to run except on very foggy nights and in the summer they will reach that city before dark. And this is what we predict will be the next move of the Bandon boosters.

### Why S. P. Cannot Change.

While the Coquille people would have been more than glad to have secured such a passenger and mail service from Portland over the Southern Pacific as Bandon, Curry county and the intermediate Coquille river points were asking, the reasons why the company could not at present accede to their requests were evident enough.

To have a train from Portland get to Coquille at 4:00 o'clock, in time for a daylight trip down the river in the late fall and early spring months, it would be necessary to start the train from Portland as early as six a. m.

When we got the Portland mail at four or five o'clock in the afternoon, it was in connecting with a train that left Portland at 1:30 and ran through to San Francisco, incidentally carrying mail and the Portland morning dailies to all Willamette, Umpqua and Rogue river valley points.

The first of the Oregon local trains to leave Portland starts at eight o'clock in the morning and formerly stopped at Eugene. After the new line down here went into the hands of the operating department the train was christened the Coos Bay Limited and its run extended to Myrtle Point. While it did not get into Coquille until 7:10 at night instead of 4:00 in the afternoon, the time of leaving Portland being six and a half hours earlier we were really in closer connection with that city than before.

A request now to have the leaving time of that train at Portland set back from eight in the morning and make it two hours earlier is, of course, one that it is impossible to grant for more reasons than one. The competing line of the Hill system, the Oregon Electric, leaves Portland at 8:30 in the morning, and as it reaches the same larger towns the S. P. does it would inevitably get all the morning travel to Woodburn, Salem, Albany and Eugene. More than that, the local travel on the entire route from Portland to Eugene would be diminished if the train ran so much earlier.

But Mr. Scott held out hopes of a possibility of such a development of traffic and tourist travel down here that a train might eventually be put on to run down here from Portland with sleepers during the night and reach the bay in the morning.

### Church Convention.

The County Convention of the Christian Churches of this county at North Bend last week closed on Sunday. Coquille was selected as the place for holding the next annual convention and the last week in May, 1918, as the date. Ned C. Kelley, of this city, was elected permanent chairman of the convention and Miss May Allen, also of this city, as permanent secretary.

In his closing sermon at North Bend Sunday, Rev. C. G. Price expressed his great appreciation of the support accorded to him by the people of North Bend and paid a warm tribute to the sympathy extended to his work by the press.

On Wednesday evening, prior to his departure from North Bend, to begin his postorate of the Christian church here, Mr. Price was given a farewell reception by his congregation there.

### Basket Ball Games.

This afternoon the High School basket ball squad and a number of students went over to Marshfield for the game there tonight with Marshfield Hi. Every local fan is pulling for them to duplicate the trick they pulled on the Bay team here when Coquille won from Marshfield 21 to 19.

The grammar grades team also accompanied the crowd for a return game with the youngsters who were over here a few weeks ago.

The game at Myrtle Point last Friday evening was a disappointment to the local followers, the Pointers winning by a 21 to 19 score.

Next Friday the next game on the home schedule will be played in the Masonic Hall here between the Coquille and North Bend high schools.

### New Depots About Finished

J. G. Horn, the North Bend contractor, was in town Wednesday and said he was engaged in the last work on his first contract for building Southern Pacific depots along the line of the Willamette Pacific. The last structure will be at Hauser. Mr. Horn said his crew had done good work and they had been working overtime and Sundays during January and got in 32 days of eight hours during that month. Mr. Horn has four other depots farther north to build and an amount of work at Reedsport, where the company is constructing platforms for freight buildings.—Record.

### Teeth in Bone Dry Law.

Here are some of the teeth and claws with which the new "Bone Dry" law of this state which went into effect last Friday is armed.

The gist of the law is found in this amended Section 5 of Chapter 1 of the laws of 1915:

"Except as hereinafter provided in this amendatory act it shall be unlawful for any person to receive, import, possess, transport, deliver, manufacture, sell, give away or barter any intoxicating liquor within this state; and the place of delivery of any intoxicating liquor is hereby declared the place of sale; provided that it shall not be unlawful for any person to have in his possession intoxicating liquor lawfully procured and in the possession of such person within this state at the time of the taking effect of this amendatory act, or lawfully obtained under the provision of this act."

Here is another provision of amended Section 6 of the same law which is intended to put an end to bootlegging by means of boats, autos or other vehicles:

(1) It shall be unlawful for any person other than a common carrier keeping such records and complying with the provisions hereinbefore set forth, to bring, introduce or deliver any intoxicating liquor into this state; and it shall be unlawful for any agent of any such common carrier or other person knowingly to deliver intoxicating liquor to any minor, or to any person known by the agent of such common carrier to be a habitual drunkard; or to any person in an intoxicated condition; and it shall be unlawful for any such common carrier or any officer, agent or employee of such common carrier knowingly to deliver intoxicating liquor to any other person than the original consignee whose name is marked on the package containing the same, as required by the provisions of chapter 250 of the general laws of the state of Oregon enacted by the legislative assembly for the year 1913; and it shall be unlawful for any person to haul, transport or carry or cause to be hauled, transported or carried on or through any street, road or other public highway within this state, for the purpose of delivery to any other person; any package containing intoxicating liquor, unless such package shall be marked as required by section 1 of said chapter 250 of the general laws of the state of Oregon, enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the year 1913, and it shall be unlawful to haul, transport or carry any such package containing intoxicating liquor on or through any street, road or other public highway within this state unless such liquor shall be in the lawful possession within the state of Oregon at the time of the going into effect of this amendatory act, of the person thus, in person or by agent, hauling, transporting or carrying the same, or shall have been lawfully received within the provisions of this act; and in any prosecution for such hauling, transporting or carrying, or for receiving intoxicating liquor in violation of this act, the burden of proof shall be on any person having such liquor in his possession within this state prior to the taking effect of this act as amended or has since been lawfully received.

Here is another interesting provision of the amended law:

"It shall be unlawful for any person to enter or be found in a state of intoxication or to drink intoxicating liquor of any kind as a beverage in or upon any engine, cars, train of cars, boat, landing, wharf or depot of any common carrier within the state of Oregon; and it shall be unlawful for any person to be drunk in any public place or building or for any person to be drunk in any private building or place and disturbing others. Any person violating this section shall upon conviction thereof be fined in any sum not less than \$10 or more than \$100, or be imprisoned in the county jail for a period not exceeding 90 days."

After reading these "house high, bull strong and pig tight" provisions of the new law, our conclusion is that if the officials charged with the enforcement of this law do their work as well as the men who framed it, booze will rapidly become a thing of the past in Oregon and sobriety will soon be universal.

### Port Met Saturday.

The Port of Bandon held its regular monthly meeting in the city hall here last Saturday morning with all commissioners present except O. A. Trowbridge. Only routine business and the allowing of bills came up, except that the day of meeting was changed from the first Saturday to the first Tuesday of the month.
