The Coos Bay grant lands are very valuable, being worth by conservative estimates, not less than \$8,000,000. They stand in the same relative posi-tion, so far as ownership is concerned, tion, so far as ownership is concerned, as the Oregon-California grant lands, which have been revested in the government and will be opened to entry and settlement provided the supreme court of the United States holds the Chamberlain-Ferris act to be constiutional and valid.

Non-Observatice of Terms On February 4th, 1908, the govern-ment brought suit against the Coos Bay Wagon Road company, or its successor in interest, the Southern Oregon company, to forfeit the lands because of the non-observance of the terms of the grant. The contentions of the government were sustained by the United States district court at Portland, and the company appealed to the circuit court of appeals in San Francisco, which tribunal has recently rendered a decision in favor of the

In other words, if the supreme
court sustains the Chamberlain- Ferris act, as to the power of Congress to enact such a law and administer the Oregon & California grant as pro vided by its terms, the decision wil settle to all practical intents and pur-poses, the power of Congress to enact a similar statute as aplied to the Coos Bay wagon road grant lands.
